### Janet Allen Legacy Foundation scholarship winner announced by WGA

Meaghan Spalla of Lakes of the Four Seasons has been selected as the 2017 WGA recipient of the Janet Allen Legacy Foundation Scholarship, as recently announced by WGA President Carol Thorsen.

Her golf skills allowed her to play on the varsity team from Boone Grove High School and also making captain for two years. She made it to Regionals twice as an individual and leading her team in her senior to Regionals. Meaghan

indicates that she was able to attain leadership skills from her serving as captain, which ultimately allowed her a spot on the Student Athlete Advisory Committee Executive Board as a freshman for Purdue Northwest. She was also nominated for the "Pride, Hustle, Desire Award" at the athlete banquet out of 200 athletes.

During her senior high school year she was offered a scholarship to play for Purdue Northwest and signed with Coach Wexler. Shortly after her signing, she suffered a huge setback from an auto accident and, while recovering, ended up losing 20 pounds and most of the muscle she had built up

throughout the years.

Meaghan shares that there were plenty of days she was frustrated with her golf abilities. She credits golf and her seven years in the LOFS Junior Golf Program with teaching her lessons about patience and determination. She worked towards regaining muscle along with a solid golf swing again throughout that summer and her first fall season golfing in college.

She ended up dropping her scores in her spring tournaments by almost 10 - 11 strokes.

Today she maintains a strict schedule of practicing at least three times a week if not more in the summer. She finished out her freshman year of college on the Dean's List with a 3.56 GPA. During this past summer, Meaghan worked at the Four Seasons Golf Course to make sure she had an employer that understood she needed time

### Time for a Tune-Up!


This season's closing will bring the golf shop into the next phase of work, golf shop renovations. The golf shop will be undergoing a facelift

throughout the off-season in a big way. The golf shop has used the same retail display system for 30 years; the systems have been very limiting and underutilize the full available wall space within the golf shop which creates crowding issues. These systems have required more and more upkeep throughout each passing year and have undergone even a few complete rebuilds with sanding and staining.

In order to maximize retail space without overcrowding the shop floor, the time has finally come to retire some of the display systems to make way for modern systems that will offer much more in terms of space from now and into the future. Some of the larger items in the shop, namely the counters will be repurposed during the facelift with integrations of the

Further responsibilities will be to coordinate and support the marketing plan and promotional programs, oversee and ensure quality tournament and instructional programs for golf and grow and expand business potential in new areas of food services and entertainment.

### Water & Sewer Utility to Host Town Hall Meeting

Community Utilities of Indiana, Inc. invites you to attend a town hall meeting on Thursday, October 26, at 7 p.m. at the Seasons Lakehouse in Lakes of the Four Seasons. Topics of discussion will include their effort to address sewer backups and overflows, and water quality improvements. Additionally, there will be a rain barrel give away after the meeting.

### Leaf Collections for the Entire Community

• Fall leaf collections will begin October 17 and continue until the final date of December 16.

- No collections after the December 16 date
- Do not mix branches, limbs and garbage with the leaves.
- DO NOT place leaves over landscape rocks or other objects that will get sucked into the leaf vac impeller.

### Prepare for Winter

It's that time of the year again to begin preparing for the cold and icy winter months ahead. Make sure your home is winterized. Walk around it and make a visual inspection of everything and take the necessary steps to make any needed maintenance to keep out the cold wind. Inspect the downspouts and gutters, to make sure they are not plugged with leaves and debris so the melting snow can drain properly.

Also, make sure the culvert under your driveway is free-flowing so ice dams can't form. Winterize your vehicles too. Inspect your tires to make sure they have

good tread on them so you can have better traction during those icy conditions. Make sure the fluids and filters are changed at the proper intervals and check the windshield wipers too.

Keeping an emergency kit in your vehicle will be handy in case you become stranded. This should contain a flashlight, blankets, windshield scraper, jumper cables, a shovel, bag of sand or salt, and a small first aid kit. Be prepared.

### Dumpsters for Home Remodeling

This was brought to my attention last year and again this past month. People have been dumping their unwanted items and trash in dumpsters that have been rented by fellow property owners for their home remodeling.

This is considered illegal dumping; in Indiana, it is considered a crime when you illegally dump items without the consent of either the resident or business responsible.

After all, you are knowingly and intentionally taking control over (rented or not) the property of another person, with the intent to deprive them, of any part of its value or use.

This is considered a Class A misdemeanor which can carry up to one (1) year in jail and fines up to \$5,000.

### Culverts and Driveways

You must apply for a permit if you plan on replacing your driveway and/ or drainage culvert.

In order to make sure property owners are installing the proper size culvert and installing them at the proper elevations, the POA has decided that property owners must apply for a permit at the POA office. Even if you're just replacing your driveway this is the perfect time to replace the drainage culvert if the POA deems it is necessary.

### What is the meaning of Halloween?

Halloween is not exactly a typical holiday, like Christmas, where we celebrate an event. Halloween celebrates a lot of things, including the lives of people who aren't with us anymore.

The history of Halloween is not entirely a clear one. Here's how historians believe it started.

Many hundreds of years ago, people called the Celts lived in Europe and on the British Isles. The Celts believed that the souls of the dead visited Earth on the last day of October. They had a festival in honor of these souls of the dead.

In time, the Roman Empire conquered the Celts and absorbed some of their beliefs as well. The Romans then combined it with their own festivals. And since the Roman Empire spread across a great part of the world, the idea that the souls of the dead visited Earth on the last day of October spread far and wide.

Many ideas from the Roman days still survive in the United States and in other Western countries. Halloween is one of them.

But how did we get the name 'Halloween'?

In the 8th Century, the Catholic Church declared

November 1 to be All Saints Day. The church calendar had a number of days honoring saints already. November 1 was picked to be the day to honor all saints who didn't already have a day named in their honor. And the mass that the Catholic Church celebrated on November 1 was called Allhallowmas. This meant "mass of all the hallowed [saintly people]". It was commonly called "All Hallows Day."

And somewhere along the line, the night before became known as 'All Hallowe'en', which was short for "evening before All Hallows' Day." It was then shortened to what we now call it, Halloween.

So why do we dress up? The tradition of dressing up for Halloween most likely comes from the medieval practices of "mumming" and "going a-souling", which historically took place on All Saints Day and All Souls Day. Mumming meant dressing up in costumes, singing, dancing, play-acting, and making other general mischief. Souling meant going door-to-door offering prayers for the dead in exchange for treats.

So enjoy this Halloween trick-or-treating, handing out candy, helping others, or praying for past loved ones. But most of all *stay safe and watch for cars, and LOFS residents please slow down and watch for crossing ghosts on All Hallows Eve.*

Reagan designated the entire month of October as National Pregnancy and Infant Loss Awareness Month. In an effort to make Pregnancy and Infant Loss Awareness more than a one-time proclamation, an American campaign successfully petitioned the federal government and its 50 governors to recognize October 15 as Pregnancy and Infant Loss Remembrance Day. Consequently, all 50 American states have

yearly proclamations and seven states have permanent proclamations. Outside of the U.S., the week prior to October 15 is known as Baby Loss Awareness Week.

Although Indiana does not have a permanent proclamation for the observance of October 15 as Pregnancy and Infant Loss Remembrance Day, it does have a law, House Bill 1190, 'Treatment of Miscarried Remains', which recognizes pregnancy loss awareness 365 days a year. This bereavement law, which became effective October 1, 2014, provides that all parents, regardless of the determined gestational age of a miscarried baby, are to be treated the same and to be in-

formed orally and in writing about available options for the final disposition of their baby's fetal remains.

Parents can either choose to provide an individual burial at their own expense or to allow the hospital to dispose of their baby's fetal remains without any additional charge. Prior to HB 1190 miscarried babies less than 20-week gestation could be disposed of as medical waste, products of conception, or as bio hazardous waste. Mass of Hope and Healing at St. Mary Church, 525 North Broad Street, in Griffith, IN. This Mass is for anyone who has experienced the death of a child through miscarriage, stillbirth, infant or childhood death. The Mass begins at 4 p.m. To prepare for the candle lighting memorial and reception after Mass, registration is preferred. On Saturday, October 15, Emma's Footprints and Taltree Arboretum & Gardens, 450 W 100 N, in Valparaiso, IN will pro-

vide parents an opportunity to participate in the International Wave of Light Observance. This observance is intended to provide a continuous chain of light that will "encompass and span across the world and around the globe" for a 24-hour period. Parents, along with their family and friends around the world, are to light a candle at 7 p.m. (in their time zone) in memory of the baby they loved and loss too soon. This event is free and open to the community. Participants are

## Operations Department

Fall is a very busy season for the Operations and Building Maintenance Departments. We have finished branch collection in Lake County and will be done with Porter County on October 7. If you have any other branches that you would like to dispose of, you can bring them to the Maintenance Facility. We are open from 6:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday to Friday.

Both departments did a fine job building our new salt barn. It is a Tension Fabric Structure that is 30' x 42' and is 16' tall. It will hold three times as much

salt as our previous structure. So we should have no shortage of salt this year.

Road paving has been completed. We added a new parking area at the 19th Hole by the water tower and a new road going down to the boat docks at Westhaven. We are now in the process of striping the roads using our new motorized striper with a 15-gallon tank for the paint. It will make striping go a lot faster and much nicer than walking it. If you happen to come upon the striper when driving use caution and please don't drive on the wet paint.

On October 17 we will

begin leaf collection. When you are putting out your leaves please remember a few things. Do not put anything other than leaves in the pile. Put plies as close to the street as possible, but not on the road. Keep piles within 6' of the edge of the road; that is as far as the vacuum hose can reach. Keep leaves away from your mail box. The hose is large and has a hard time getting around objects. If you are placing your "tall grass" or yard clippings out for collection make sure that they are no longer than one foot in length. Longer pieces will clog up the hose.

Approach the leaf Vacs with caution, it is a very loud machine and the operator cannot hear cars coming. The sun will be setting earlier and many times we will be vacu-

uming leaves when it is dark out; so please be careful.

This year we added a new "Mini Vac" that we will be using to collect leaves in the cul-de-sacs. It is half the size of the ones we have now and will be pulled by our new F350 dump truck. If you live in a cul-de-sac do not park on the street when you or your neighbors have leaves out. If you do you will risk yours or your neighbor's leaves not being collected. We know that all leaves don't fall at the same time so we will be making several trips down all the streets. We will be collecting leaves until December 16 or until the first major snow fall.

We will also be preparing for winter, which includes the installation of snow stakes; please don't pull them out. We place them in special

spots for the plow truck drivers so they will be able to maneuver in heavy snow falls. Many times I have seen them pulled out and thrown in ditches or people using them to mark their own driveways. We have over 26 miles of roads that we mark; it takes many hours to do that. So please do us a favor and leave them alone.

Don't forget that the maintenance facility has containers for electronics and white goods. We also take used tires. The containers are located on the North end of the facility and are clearly marked. We DO NOT take paint, oil or gasoline.

Have a safe a beautiful fall season.





# Cemeteries of Porter Township reveal pieces of area's past

A past article described the two cemeteries in Winfield Township, near the Four Seasons. Now, we detail the cemeteries, past and present, of Porter Township.

The largest and best-known cemetery in Porter Township, Porter County, is the one associated with the Salem United Methodist Church, on County Road West 350 South, just east of County Line Road.


The church was founded in 1844, and the cemetery, with 726 graves, many of them early settlers, and with Civil War veterans, is active today. The church website shows burials as early as 1844. Prominent burials include Jeremy Hixon (d. 1861), early resident of Winfield Township, Dennis Palmer Sr. (d. 1875), founder of the town of Palmer, Raymond Williams (d. 1876), pensioner of the War of 1812,

and Jimmy Hooseline (d. 2013), local farmer and realtor who sold many lots in the Seasons.

Most of the other old cemeteries in Porter Township, past and present, were named for the families that started and used them, or the families who gave the land for them. Two cemeteries, relatively obscure and well-hidden, are within less than a mile, as the crow flies, from the Four Seasons.

The Guernsey Cemetery, established in 1850, is on a hill, about 120 yards east of County Line Road, on Road 38 South, a gravel road just south of Division Road. It contains 43 graves, and names buried include Guernsey, Young, Taber, and Dickson. A Civil War veteran, Nick Hooseline, Co. I, 73rd. Indiana Infantry, also rests there.

Some stones are quite illegible. A most unusu-



al tombstone for Seviah Guernsey (d. 1864) is made of poured concrete, with rusting nail heads used as lettering. The earliest burial was in 1851, and the most recent observed was in 1920.

Finding the Frame Cemetery is not for the faint of heart. It is located in a wooded area about 250 yards west of CR 675 West, about a half mile south of CR100S,

on the homestead that William Frame took as a claim from the government. There are 18 known graves and some unmarked ones, and most of the tombstones are damaged, unreadable, or gone.

Burials were between 1839 and 1877, mostly of the Frame family. The only undamaged marker is thought to be of two McGinley infants. Apparently, the current



owner of the property has recently cleared brush and installed a sign (see the accompanying photographs).

In addition to the Guernsey Cemetery, the Porter Town-

ship Trustee maintains several other cemeteries, all of which are in good condition. These, along with several others that no longer exist, will be described in a subsequent article.

### Update on Big Bass Lake

The Big Bass Lake CR 725 Inlet Floodplain project has been completed. The Lakes Department just recently put the finishing touches on the project by installing the erosion control blanket and seeded the area with native vegetation.

We also relocated, extended, and replaced several aeration units on Big Bass Lake to deeper areas of the lake. This should reduce introduction of phosphorus into the water column from the nutrient rich sediments, which in return will help with the blue/green algae blooms in the future. ### Geese

I have had some residents

contact me regarding the Canadian Geese. We did our annual goose round up this year in June and some of the geese have already returned to the area. Geese have a strong tendency to return to the same area year after year. Once geese start nesting in a particular place, the stage is already set for more geese in successive years.

The problem is further exacerbated when well-intentioned people purposely feed geese. Artificial feeding of geese tends to concentrate larger numbers of geese in areas that under normal conditions would only support a few geese. Artificial feeding can also disrupt normal migration patterns and hold geese in areas longer than what would be normal. With an abundant source of artificial food available, geese can devote more time to locating nesting sites and mating. Artificial feeding can also



concentrate geese on adjacent properties where their presence may not be welcomed.

Congregating geese can cause a number of problems. Damage to landscaping can be significant and expensive to repair or replace, while large amounts of excrement can render swimming areas, parks, golf courses, lawns, docks, and patios unfit for human use. Since they are active grazers, they are particularly attracted to lawns and ponds located near apartment complexes, houses, office areas and golf courses. Geese can rapidly denude lawns, turning them into barren, dirt areas.

An adult goose can produce between one and two pounds of feces per day. Phosphorus and nitrates are some of the primary nutrients entering our lakes which cause excessive plant growth. Those plants include various types of algae, including Blue Green Algae, which not only looks and smells bad but it can be a health hazard. Geese are responsible for about 20% of these nutrients entering our lakes.

Geese are particularly aggressive during breeding and nesting season. Their behavior can cause problems around homes and playgrounds when geese attack



and nip at residents.

Urban areas are usually attractive places for geese because they prefer nicely groomed lawns adjacent to water. This preference; reduced predator rates; limited hunting in most situations; and feeding by residents result in nuisance waterfowl concerns in urban areas.

Feeding ducks and geese is a popular practice for many people, but it is also a major reason why geese are attracted to certain areas and remain there for long periods of time. Feeding geese only leads to human-geese conflicts. Feeding also increases the susceptibility to avian

diseases, which have the potential to kill large numbers of geese and other waterfowl.

You can help make geese feel unwelcome and move on by:

- Installing a 20" high goose fence with reflective tape along the lake shore.
- Do not feed the geese.
- Geese do not like dogs or swans, so placing decoys near the lake will help keep geese from feeling welcome.

### Leaves in the Lake

Leaves have begun to change color and start falling. The Lakes of the Four Seasons' Maintenance Department will be hard at work collecting the leaves left alongside the streets.

Previous years have seen lake side property owners blowing and dumping leaves into the lakes. Dumping your leaves in the lakes may have serious, negative side-effects on the lake waters.

The LOFS POA and the Lakes Department is requesting that property owners not dump their leaves in the lakes during their annual fall clean-up. This is because leaves have nutrients simi-

lar to fertilizer. They contain high levels of nitrogen, phosphorus, and potassium. When leaves are naturally blown into the lake from trees on a shoreline, the lake can handle the influx. But when many lake residents dump hillsides full of leaves into the lake, it can upset the natural ecological balance.

When too many leaves are dumped into the lakes it can cause an excessive amount of algae growth, and while the lakes need some algae for a healthy food chain, too much can cause an algae bloom, turning the lake water a thick pea green color with a foul odor.

Some algae can release toxins that might harm humans, animal life and fish.

But even with non-toxic algae blooms, as the overabundance of algae dies, it decays, causing bacteria to use up the oxygen in the water. This can kill fish and other aquatic life.

Another environmentally sound and inexpensive way to dispose of fallen leaves is composting. Composting takes no more effort than bagging the leaves and finding a corner in the yard to place them. As a result, the property owner will have the perfect material for mulching plants or bedding material. Mulching with compost adds nutrients back into the ground that were taken out by the natural processes of the tree's growth.

This has been a spooky fall so far. The hurricanes in the south and east to the wildfires in the west, and now we are experiencing a drought in the Midwest. I hope the weather starts to get back to some kind of normal soon. The drought has helped us keep up with the normal grass cutting going into leaf season. Most years the grass is growing so fast that it is difficult to keep up with during this time of the year.

The trees have started changing color and dropping leaves approximately three weeks earlier this year. I fear that it will be an early and harsh winter.

We have done our best to get everything seeded before October 1, but there are some areas that we just could not get to. The goal is to finish

seeding them the first week of October and hope that the plant can mature enough to make it through a tough winter.

The drop area tee on 16 and the soil that was placed on the left side of 15 green are growing in well. The approach on 5 has had a drainage pipe installed and is covered with soil and seed. 
