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## Old books sometimes reveal interesting finds about our Region

Somewhere in the Good Book, there is the passage "Seek and Ye shall find". Well, this old writer found some very interesting things as he was seeking information about the history of our area.

It seems that the book 'Counties of Porter and Lake', edited by W. A. Goodsend and published in 1882, and found in the Valparaiso library, contains some rather interesting tid-

bits. The book describes early life in Porter and Winfield Townships and the biographies of some early citizens, and it will lead to a multipart series of stories, much of which will be taken verbatim from the book.

We start first with Porter Township, simply because it was formed in 1837, six years before Winfield Township. At first it was known as Fish Lake Township, which name it took from a lake then known as Fish Lake. This lake is now known as Lake Eliza. The citizens did not like the name and proceeded to circulate a petition to have the name changed. The petition was presented

to the Board of County Commissioners in June 1841. The prayers of the petitioners were answered, and the name of Porter was applied to the Township, taken from the county named after Commodore David Porter.

An early election in the Township was held in the house of Alpheus French on Monday, December 3, 1838 for the purpose of electing one Representative. A total of 18 men voted, including two Frames, a Dinwiddie, two Hurlburts, a Campbell, and a McCoy. It was reported that "We the undersigned Judges and Clerks of Elections do certify that Benjamin McCarty had 15

votes for Representative and George Cline three votes for the same office; signed by Johnathon Hough, H. M. Wilson, Clerks; S. Campbell, Inspector, and William Frakes, and Alpheus French, Judges."

In the years 1834 and 1835, a number of settlers came to Porter Township, including Newton and William Frame, Samuel and Isaac Campbell, Elder and Ora French, Jacob Wolf, and David Hurlburt. Others before 1838 included Edmund, Hazard, and Benjamin Sheffield, William Nichols, Morris Carman, Ezra Reeves, and P. A. Porter. Doctor Levi Cass came in 1840; H. Bates came in 1841.

Others with names of Bartel, Hough, Hatch, Shreve, and Wellman came shortly after. Elder French, a Baptist minister, was the first preacher in the township. Besides those mentioned above, others with last names of Robinson, Fleming, Gates, Dye, Jones, Cobb, and Service settled in the township. From 1840 to 1850, immigration was slow but steady. It was mentioned that a large portion of the present population (1882) were descendants of the first settlers.

The experiences of the early settlers of the township with the Indians was about the same as that of the surrounding country.

The Indians were friendly and made little trouble. The township was chiefly prairie, and it was not frequented as much by Indians as were places where there was more woodland. It was not uncommon to see herds of deer containing from 30 to 50 animals. These were gradually thinned out as the settlements increased, until they disappeared completely.

The next part of this series will describe some early events in Porter Township, such as a wolf hunt, Indian mounds, and early schools and churches. Some of these may be contrary to some information previously reported.

The Buddy Bag program through NWI No Child Hungry provides participating children with prepacked bags containing kid friendly nonperishable breakfast, lunch, snacks and dinner to feed them throughout the weekend.

NWI No Child Hungry is currently working with Porter Lakes Elementary, Boone Grove Elementary, Boone Grove Middle School, Boone Grove High School, Winfield and Jerry Ross Elementary. In addition to these schools they recently began serving Hebron Schools and will continue to grow and expand as they are able to.

## **INDOT** scholarships available for civil engineering students

The Indiana Department of Transportation is offering civil engineering students scholarships of up to \$3,125 per semester, and paid employment during summer breaks and upon graduation. Students must be accepted or enrolled full time in one of Indiana's certified civil engineering schools and apply using the form at www. INDOTScholarship.IN.gov. Applications for the 2021-22 school year must be submitted by December 31, 2020. INDOT's scholarship program uses federal funds to offer \$3,125 per semester or \$2,083 per trimester for up to five years of post-secondary civil engineering education. Scholarship funds can be applied to educational expenses, fees and books. In return, recipients will work for INDOT in full-time, paid positions during their summer breaks and upon graduation.

Students must be accepted or enrolled full time in one of Indiana's Accreditation Board for Engineering and Technology certified civil engineering programs. Eligible programs include Purdue University, Rose-Hulman Institute of Technology, Purdue University Fort Wayne, University of Southern Indiana, Trine University, Purdue University Northwest, University of Evansville, University of Notre Dame, and Valparaiso University. With the cold weather slowly making its way in, we need to start being even more careful around the community's bodies of water. Soon we will start seeing the ice form and of course people chancing the thickness to fish, skate, or just to walk on. I know by now some of you are tired of reading about ice / cold water safety since it is something I write about on a yearly basis. However, seeing how I have been involved in a few ice rescues during

my time with this department as well as during my time on the LOFS Fire Department, I know and have seen the dangers firsthand.

It's a horrible feeling when you have to respond to a call knowing there is a high chance it could end in tragedy, and the overwhelming thought of "if you had just gotten there a little sooner" maybe it could have ended differently. Maybe if they had just listened or read this article days prior it wouldn't have happened at all. Those are just some of the thoughts that some rescuers might have stuck in their heads, I know it's some of the thoughts I personally have had to deal with each year.

So, what do we know about ice strength? Well it depends on the thickness, snow coverage, water depth, water flow, and temperature change. Now think about these and think about our lakes. I'm not going to give examples of each with our lakes, but think about the snow coverage on our lakes. the depths of our lakes, and just how often mother nature changes our temperatures from one extreme to another and you should get the point.

We know that snow acts like an insulation blanket when on top of the ice and can impede its formation.

We know that just because its cold out does not mean the ice is thicker since wind can actually affect its growth. A light wind might speed up the growth of ice while a heavy wind can slow it down. An example, during heavy winds you will see those holes in the ice stay open and that wind could actually be getting under the ice and causing it to thaw or decay from below.

Since we can have days in the winter that go from 10°F on one day to 40°F on the next you would expect to see slush appear. Well that slush also appears on lakes which means the water is no longer freezing from below.

These are just three examples of what we see yearly and they are all screaming

about the dysfunctionality of Northwest Indiana's weather, so why chance it?

But, despite my dislike for people being on the ice I know its unavoidable; so each year you will have to read what you should do if you or someone you are with falls in to the cold icy water.

One of the most important things is remembering that you should NEVER go out on to a body of ice alone, but if you do self-rescue may be your only chance.

Hopefully, you are with someone who has already called 911 and who will also be there to "coach" you on what to do or is able to reach you safely; but if that is not the case then you NEED to do the following.

First turn back to where

#### you fell in from. Place your elbows on the ice and extend your arms out onto the ice while at the same time pulling and kicking your legs like a frog as hard as they can to get their body on top and out of the water.

Once out, stay in a laid down position so as to keep your body weight evenly distributed along the ice. Start to roll away from the open water back the way you came or where you believe the ice will be thick enough to stand up and exit the iced over area.

From there get somewhere warm, a car or nearby home and remove the wet clothing so you can get your body temp back up.

Remember that the only absolute in ice safety is staying off of it.

Martian Mission Captain's Log #1: Stardate 54358 November 2020.






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
