





#### A reminder about LOFS snow removal procedures

The Lakes of the Four Seasons Operations Department wants residents to be cautious and prepared during the winter season.

The department's snow removal procedures are as follows:

- Plow and salt trucks are used when the conditions deem it necessary. The Security Department is to contact the on-call maintenance personnel of bad road conditions during off hours between the hours of 4 p.m. and 7:30 a.m. weekdays, on weekends and holidays.
- Plowing will continue until midnight and begin again at 4 a.m. on weekdays.

**Priorities** 

- Front Entrance, N.L.S.D., 117th Ave. Automated Entrance, Kingsway Dr., W.L.S.D., Porter County Automated Entrance, Four Seasons Parkway.
- Forest Lane, Sunnyslope Dr., E.L.S.D., Green Valley Dr., Hidden Valley Dr.
- All remaining roads.
- Cul-de-sacs, Seasons Lakehouse parking lots and 19th Hole parking lots.
- Seasons Lakehouse sidewalks and 19th Hole sidewalks.

The Lakes of the Four Seasons Operations Department and employees will not be held responsible for any damages to mailboxes or stands that are already in disrepair.

The Operations Depart-

ment requests the following from drivers and residents:

- Yield the right of way to the plow and salt trucks for your safety and the operator's safety
- Vehicles must not be parked on or along roadways and cul-de-sacs. The Operations Department needs as much open area as possible to place the snow and to maneuver through the narrow roadways.
- Please do not put snow from your driveway into the streets. Frozen snow piles when hit with the plow, could force plow trucks into oncoming traffic.
- Place the snow on the left side (downstream of road traffic) of your driveway as you face it.

The POA Board of Directors will hold a regular POA meeting on Monday, December 13 with the presentation of the 2022-23 preliminary budget to follow afterwards. The second meeting with the proposed budget will be presented on January 10, 2022 with the approval of the budget on January 24, 2022. The board encourages resident's input, so they can assure that the upcoming year is supported for the needs of the community.

#### **Leaf Collections**

Leaf collections will continue until December 15 or until the weather makes it too difficult to do so. The leaf vacs cannot suck up frozen leaf piles. This is a large task for the residents and the Operations Department to attend to every year and I want to commend everyone for the

job you do. Every leaf collected is one more leaf that won't accumulate into the lakes, swales, and culverts.

#### **Branch Collections**

Branch collections have been completed for the year

so please refrain from placing branches out after the normal collection times.

The only other time the Operations Department will collect branches from property owners beyond the normal collection time is if a storm event has knocked branches off of your tree. If you do have branches needing collection after a storm event, please contact the Operations Department at 219-988-4461.

You must contact a contractor to remove your branches or trees from your property for all other reasons. You also have the option to bring your branches to the Operations facility at 3861 Kingsway Drive during normal operating hours.

Live Christmas trees will be collected by the Operations Department starting Monday, January 3 until Friday, January 14. Please remove all decorations before placing them on your road berm for collection. Snowplowing

The Operations Department has been marking the roadway curves and critical areas with painted stakes before the ground freezes so they can efficiently plow the roads, culde-sacs and parking lots in case of snow. The trucks will be prepared and awaiting our first big snow. I would like to

remind residents to please not push or blow snow onto the roads as this only creates a dangerous situation for those driving.

#### Stay Off the Ice!

Please stay of the ice and please keep an eye on anyone that you may see walking around or on the ice, including animals. Please contact the Security Department to inform them when you see anyone walking on the ice.

The POA office will be closed December 23, 24, 30, and 31 for the holidays and will reopen on Monday, January 3, 2022.

#### **Indiana Conservation Officers urge Hoosiers** to practice ice safety: 'No ice is safe ice'

Conservation Officers advise being mindful of the potential hazards of frozen lakes, ponds, rivers and streams.

It's also important to keep a watchful eye on neighborhood retention ponds, lakes and other waterways for others who may venture out and find themselves in trouble.

Every winter, thousands of Hoosiers safely enjoy fishing, skating, hiking, or just sliding around on frozen ponds and lakes. And every year, people drown after falling through ice.

Just like driving differently on snow versus clear roads, some may need to relearn how to safely have fun on ice.

Put safety first. The best rule of thumb is, when thinking about getting on the ice, believe it is thin ice unless proven otherwise.

Here are a few tips to re-

member when considering standing on or walking on a frozen lake or pond:

- No ice is safe ice.
- Test the thickness of the ice with an ice auger. At least 4 inches of ice is recommended for ice fishing; 5 inches is recommended for snowmobiling.
- If you don't know the thickness of the ice, don't go on it.
- Wear life jackets or flotation coats.
- Carry ice hooks and rope
- Before going on the ice, leave a note of your whereabouts with a friend or family member.
- Don't test the thickness of the ice while alone.

Wearing a life jacket is especially important when on the ice. If you fall through, a life jacket will keep your head above the water until help arrives.

Snow can insulate ice, causing it to freeze at a slower rate. When snow and rain freeze into ice, it is never as strong as solid, clear ice.

If you see a pet or other animal in distress on the ice, do not go after it. Doing so can often end in tragedy. Instead, contact your local emergency response personnel, who are equipped to make a rescue.

Some bodies of water will appear to be frozen solid but actually can have thin ice in several potentially unexpected areas. Flowing water, such as rivers and streams, should be avoided when covered by a layer of ice. Water that is surrounded by sand may freeze with inconsistencies in the thickness of the ice.

Underground springs, wind, waterfowl, and other animals can also keep areas of ice thin.

#### Access Indiana portal surpasses one million users by offering 43 services

Access Indiana (www.access.IN.gov), a Next Level project, has surpassed one million users. Access Indiana is a single sign-on system that provides a more streamlined and secure approach to government services. With a single username and password, users can access 43 services.

Users have access to a variety of services on their personal dashboard including the Indiana Vaccination Portal, myLicense, INBiz, DRIVE, DNR Fish & Wildlife, and more.

"I urged the creation of Access Indiana to make it more convenient and sim-

ple to get services from or do business with the State of Indiana. Access Indiana is an easy, one-stop shop for a variety of important state government services," Gov. Eric Holcomb said. "Only two years ago we implemented this portal with only one application - but now with more than 40 services - which previously needed separate logins, users can today use one username and one password to get to them all. That is efficient government service and how we are taking 'One Indiana, For All' to the next level."

Access Indiana went live with its first service in March

2019 and has steadily added new applications. Over the past twelve months, more than 900,000 new users have joined the system.

Users can update all of their account information, like email and phone number, check notifications such as scheduling a BMV appointment or checking tax refund status, and more by signing in at www.access. in.gov.

Additional services are continually being added to Access Indiana, with the ultimate goal of needing only one user identity to interact online with the state.





## Early eastern philanthropist Carnegie left his legacy in our area

Nowadays

not many people will recall the name of Andrew Carnegie. However, well over a hundred years ago, his was a common household name, and he left his legacy in many communities throughout our country, including some in Northwest Indiana.

Let's find out more about him and his contributions to society, the Carnegie Libraries.

Carnegie was born in Scotland in 1835 and emigrated as a youth to Pittsburgh, PA, where he toiled first in a textile mill before being a telegrapher and a messenger to the Pennsylvania Railroad.

Being an aggressive and impressive man, he quickly became the personal secretary and telegrapher to the president of the railroad. He got to know various businessmen in the city, handling

various dealings for the railroad, and was ultimately promoted to division superintendent. As an ambitious man, he invested in the new developing oil business, in railroad sleeping cars, and in

Western Union. Carnegie resigned from the railroad, then bought into the Keystone Bridge Co., which was replacing wooden railroad bridges with those made of iron and steel. To supply plates and beams for these bridges, he invested in iron mills in the area.

While traveling in Europe, he saw the new Bessemer process for making steel, and he adapted this concept to his iron mills, and had new steel mills built with this technology. He also bought out other steel works to form the Carnegie Steel Co. He ultimately sold his company to J.P. Morgan in 1901 to form the United States Steel Corporation.

Carnegie's philanthropic givings began about 1870. Although he supported various projects and causes, he

is best known for his gifts of free public library buildings. Between 1883 and 1929, a total of 2,509 Carnegie Libraries were built worldwide, of which 1,689 were in this country. He initially had libraries built in places where he had personal connections, namely his birthplace in Scotland and in the Pittsburgh area where his steel mills were. His first library was in Dunfermline, Scotland, and the first in this country was in Braddock, PA, home of his Edgar Thompson Steel Works.

Surprisingly, the state of Indiana had 165 Carnegie Libraries, the most of any state, of which many were local to us. Did you know that Hebron, Crown Point, Valparaiso, Gary, Hobart, Whiting, East Chicago, North Judson, Lowell, and LaPorte, among others, all had these libraries?

Even the small farming hamlets of Brook and Francesville south of us were privileged to have these facilities. Many of these building

are still standing, some still used as libraries, others as community centers for various uses.

To say the least, these library buildings are somewhat unique, made mostly of brick, two stories, and are easily recognized. When in Crown Point, it may be interesting to see the old library at 223 South Main Street (see

photo), now used as an office.

Or Hobart, at 706 East 4th Street, where the old library now houses the historical society. The Hebron library at 201 West Sigler Street is still in the brick building that Carnegie donated. The one remaining Carnegie library building in Gary is at 1501 Madison Street, abandoned and rather dilapidated, and a

visit is not recommended.

Andrew Carnegie, in his later years, lived in his mansion in New York City. He died in 1919 and is buried in a small cemetery in Sleepy Hollow, NY, the town of Ichabod Crane and Headless Horseman fame. Ironically, the town did not have one of his libraries.


