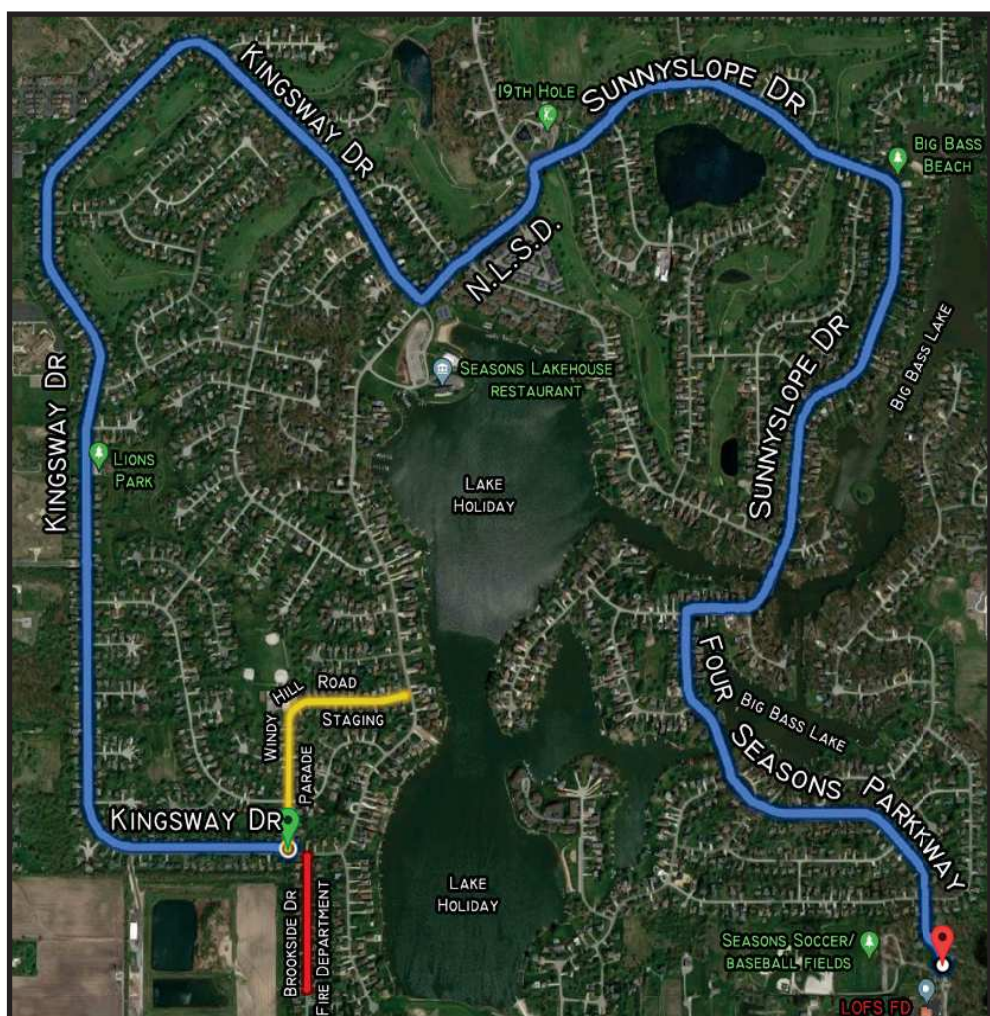

The Lions Announce the Annual Fourth of July Parade

The Annual Fourth of July Parade is being held this year!
Theme: The American Spirit!

There are big changes for the 2020 parade due to COVID-19. All of this is for the safety of our parade entrants, community members and guests. Social distancing will still apply after July 3rd based on the order of the Indiana Governor.

There is a new route for just this year, see the map in The Seasonal and on social media. The Fire Force will be using a tracking app so everyone can see where the front of the parade is located in real time. The app, "Glimpse" does not have to be downloaded. The link will be shared on July 4th at 11:30 AM on the Fire Force Facebook page and the LOFS Insiders Facebook page. The route is being lengthened to assist with social distancing and so more of our community can see the parade without being in a large crowd.

The parade route will start on the Lake County side, at Kingsway and Windy Hill Drive going west, this is the opposite way the parade normally runs. The parade will finish near the soccer fields and the Fire Department on the Porter County side. The route is just over 5 miles long, so everyone should plan on being in a vehicle, whether it is a truck, golf cart, car, or float.

Parade Entrant Rules for 2020:
All parade entries must report to the parade booth to get a number for your lead vehicle, no exceptions. The check in point is at W. Lakeshore and Rustic Lane.
With the longer route, we need to know how many entrants we have in order to have our roads under control during the parade. Skipping the check in with the Lions' parade directors will have you banished from the parade. We care for your safety and the safety of those viewing the parade.

First responders and military will line up on Brookside Drive. Security will come into the front to lead the parade, then the first responders and military will follow.
Everyone else in the parade will line up on Windy Hill Road off of Kingsway Drive. No entrants can line up directly behind the first responders, military or flag bearers while they are on Brookside Drive.

Keeping social distancing in mind, no cutting into the route to get a better spot. And sadly (sorry everyone) no throwing of candy or other giveaways.
So, with the rules, maybe it doesn't sound like much fun, but it still will be!
There will still be the American and Four Seasons Spirit on display. Trophies will be given out to the top 3 entries along with bragging rights. With the longer route, everyone can show off their teams, businesses, vehicles and volunteer organizations. Practice that wave, ready those flags, and show off your American Spirit!

Independence Day Holiday

The Independence Day celebration will not take place this year. There will be a parade with vehicles only; no walkers. There will be no throwing of candy or other giveaways. The parade route is available on the LOFS website.

The Fireworks display, presented by Melrose Pyrotechnics, will begin after dusk (generally around 9 p.m.) on July 4. The fireworks will again be shot off over the lake from the Seasons Lakehouse grounds. The Seasons Lakehouse and upper grounds will be closed all day while the fireworks are setup.

I ask that all residents abide by the Fireworks Resolution. A copy of the resolution is available on the website at www.lofs.org.

The POA Board of Directors has approved

charging \$20 to all vehicles without POA stickers entering into the community between the hours of 6 p.m. and 9 p.m. on July 4. They must give the LOFS address that they will be visiting. The Fire Force will be collecting the fee.

The parking lots will only be available to vehicles with current LOFS stickers on them, all others will be turned away.

The LOFS Pool will open on Sunday, July 5

The pool will be open seven days a week. Lap Swim will take place from 8 a.m. to 11 a.m. Open Swim will take place from 11 a.m. to 7 p.m.

If you already purchased a Family Pool Membership you will be refunded \$30 due to the shortened season. If you purchased a Family Pool Membership and do not want to utilize it this season please contact the POA Office and request a full refund.

If you want to purchase a Family Pool Membership for the remainder of the season the cost will be \$55. Daily Fee is \$7. Purchase of 10 Daily Fees Swim Card is \$40.

There will be no swim lessons offered this season.

Temporary Golf Cart Rental Permits

A reminder to residents that are renting golf carts and using them to get around the community during the Fourth of July holiday. If you are going to do this, you must purchase a temporary golf cart permit from the POA office. The fee for this permit is \$80

If you are caught driving one of these rental carts with-

out a temporary permit you will be issued a citation with a fine that will cost more than the permit fee.

Carts must have working rear taillights and head lights that are connected through the carts electrical system if it will be operated on the roads after dark.

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Public Safety Department

Use of Beach Amenities

Over the past several weeks, officers from this department as well as members of the Lakes Department have been checking the beaches looking for non-residents using them. We have noticed on several days there are a lot of vehicles parking along Sandy Beach that do not have decals and appearing to be non-residents. While it is true some of these

cars belong to non-residents, however, in some cases we are finding these cars are members of the community that have either opted for a variance, or chose not to purchase a decal for their cars.

When we approach someone on the beach area, we are asking to see an ID in the form of a driver's license. Those who cannot provide one are asked to retrieve it so they may be allowed to stay and are willing to do so.

Those who are found to

be non-residents who are visiting a family member or friend are politely asked to leave the beach area until they are accompanied by a resident which follows the rules of the community.

That being said, in order to avoid being asked to leave the beach area, I would ask our community member attending our beaches to make sure they are carrying with them an ID showing residency within the community. I would further ask that if you are attending the beach with friends or family if at all possible have those people meet you at your home and carpool to the beach so as to free up the parking area for others.

Use of Fireworks

The community has always followed the State guidelines when it comes to our residents discharging fireworks within the community. *The following is the State of Indiana approved days and times for discharging fireworks within the Lakes of the Four Seasons: between 5 p.m., and two (2) hours after sunset on June 29, June 30, July 1, July 2, July 3, July 5, July 6, July 7, July 8, and July 9; between the hours of 10 a.m., and 12 a.m. midnight on July 4; and between the hours of 10 a.m. on December 31, and 1 a.m. on January 1.*

So, to all those who have been choosing to discharge

your fireworks earlier than the state allowed dates and times, please know you are subject to citations being issued in accordance with the POA Fine Structure and Resolution No. 2007-06 11. This resolution calls for a fine to be issued at \$250 for any committed violation.

I would also ask our resident to remember there are members of this community that have proudly served our country and currently battling the added stress of PTSD upon coming home. Those sudden explosions may be fun for you, but for some it could trigger a startled response for those who have witnessed an event during their time of deployment.

Let's be considerate to these men and women and respect what they may be going through. If you know of a Veteran in the area, reach out to them and let them know what is going on or your intentions of lighting off fireworks. You might find they don't have a problem with the noise, or you might find they are appreciative for your concern of them and will make arrangements for themselves during that time. Either way it's the polite and respectable things to do for someone that has done so much for you.

The Public Safety Department wants to wish everyone a **SAFE** and **HAPPY** 4th of July.

LOFS golf cart rules and regulations for road use

Vehicles such as golf carts are designed to be a safe vehicle when used as intended. However, there has never been any type of vehicle produced that is absolutely mechanically failsafe. The key to safe operation is your knowledge of the vehicle.
A) Recognizing and accepting it as a machine
B) Respecting its capabilities and its limitations
C) Varying operating conditions
D) Knowledge of laws
E) Good judgment and courtesy

Golf carts are the only vehicles allowed access onto our golf course with a golf membership. This is only allowed when actually playing golf and after the golf cart operator and passenger involved have signed in at the golf pro shop.

The following rules and regulations have been established by the Lakes of the Four Seasons Board of Directors for operating golf carts within the community.
• 1. Only those golf carts owned by a resident with a current POA GC decal are

allowed to operate within Lakes of the Four Seasons; exception is a temporary golf cart permit for no more than four days. The decal must be placed on the lower part of the front windshield on the driver's side. A golf cart is exempt from an annual decal if it is ONLY driven on the property owner's own property.
• 2. The POA strongly recommends that you have liability insurance on your golf cart.
• 3. A person must be at least sixteen (16) years of

age to operate any motorized vehicle, including a golf cart within Lakes of the Four Seasons. The operator of a golf cart must possess and be able to produce a current valid driver's license for age verification and identification purposes. Driving restrictions - Probationary Drivers License
A) You may not drive between 10 p.m. and 5 a.m. for 180 days after getting your license.
B) You may not drive during the following hours:
-Saturday and Sunday, be-

tween 1 a.m. and 5 a.m.
-Sunday through Thursday, after 11 p.m.
-Monday through Friday, before 5 a.m.
C) Driving with passengers
- You may not drive with passengers for 180 days after getting your probationary license, unless you are accompanied in the front seat by a licensed individual with a valid driver's license who is at least 25 years of age.
• 4. While operating any motorized vehicle, including a golf cart, within Lakes of the four Seasons, the operator must adhere to all state and Lakes of the Four Seasons

rules and regulations pertaining to that type of vehicle. Including all legal safety equipment, passenger guidelines, traffic rules, and maintain the motor vehicle and its noise dissipative device in good working order.
• 5. No golf carts are allowed to operate on the "sandy" part of any beach in Lakes of the Four Seasons. Golf carts may be operated on the outer edges of each park within the community.
• 6. Golf Carts that will be operated after dusk on any LOFS property or roadways are required to have lights.

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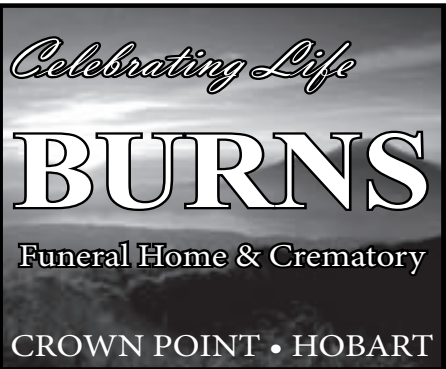
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You must obtain a permit for Children from My School Childcare and Learning Center graduate above-ground structures

If you are planning on building or installing any above ground structure on your property you must obtain a permit from the POA office. If you have any questions about having a structure built or installed on your property please call the P.O.A. office at 219-988-2581.

As stated under 3.1.2. in the Restrictive Covenants: No dwelling house, storage shed, tennis court, dog pen or run, outbuilding, swimming pool, or other above

ground structure shall be constructed, placed, or altered on any numbered lot in the Subdivision nor shall any boat lift, pier, float, or similar structure be placed entirely or partly within any lake in the Subdivision, unless plans and specifications showing the nature, kind, shape, height, materials, and location thereof shall have been submitted to, and approved in writing by, not less than two members of the Building Control Committee for the Association.

- At a minimum, they must have two headlights and at least one taillight. The lights must be on anytime the golf cart is operated after dusk. All lights must be permanently affixed to the golf cart and operated through the cart’s electrical system.
- 7. When any golf cart is not equipped with turn signals and brake lights, the operator must use acceptable hand signals to denote right and left turns and slowing down or braking.
- 8. The operations of motorized vehicles, including golf carts, is restricted from all private property without the consent of the property owner.
- 9. Golf carts shall not be operated in a reckless manner.
- 10. The operator (or prop-

- erty owner) of a golf cart will be liable for any damage caused to POA or private property within Lakes of the Four Seasons.
- 11. Golf carts with a single forward facing bench seat are allowed no more than three riders; the operator and two passengers. No one is allowed to stand up on a golf cart while it is in motion. Passengers are not allowed to stand up and hang on while riding on a golf cart. They must be properly seated. Golf carts that have a rear facing bench seat would be allowed to carry additional passengers, as long as they are properly seated and they are secured by a seat belt. No more than two, or if enough room three, passengers are allowed to ride in a rear facing bench seat. They

- must be properly seated. Passengers are not allowed to kneel in any seat, sit on another passenger’s lap or to stand on any portion of a moving golf cart.
 - 12. Operators of golf carts should use extreme caution when riding on our roads, grounds, and parking lots. Golf carts are smaller and travel at a much slower speed than other types of vehicles. This can make them harder to see by operators of other vehicles sharing the roadways. Use good common sense and pull to the right to allow the faster traffic on the roadway to get around you when you see you have traffic backed up behind you.
- Operators of golf carts are expected to follow all rules contained herein, and any policies, procedures, rules and

- regulations adopted by either the Lakes of the Four Seasons Country Club or the Lakes of the Four Seasons Property Owner’s Association Board of Directors.
- Violations are covered under the Fine Structures adopt-

- ed by the LOFS POA Board of Directors. REMEMBER: Rules and regulations are made to restrict the actions of those people who are inconsiderate toward the property and rights of others. If you, in any way violate the laws

- of the state or Lakes of the Four Seasons, you are being inconsiderate and should and WILL suffer the consequences. Know and obey all the rules and regulations set up by the Lakes of the Four Seasons Board of Directors.

Make water safety a priority this summer when recreating around bodies of water

With summer in full swing, Indiana Conservation Officers remind Hoosiers to make safety a priority when recreating around bodies of water.

“Even when fun is your main focus, always recognize the danger water poses, even to strong swimmers or experienced boaters,” said Capt. Jet Quillen of DNR Law Enforcement.

- If you are going to be recreating around water, follow these basic safety tips:
- Discuss the dangers of water with your family and loved ones before going out.
 - Wear a lifejacket.
 - Tell someone where you are going and when you will return.
 - Go with a buddy.

- Do not venture around flooded or fast-moving waterways.
- Avoid alcohol.

In addition to basic water safety, Indiana Conservation Officers also stress the importance of boating safety and remind boaters to know the rules of the water.

Reducing a boat’s speed in unfamiliar areas and being aware of

unusual water conditions respective to the size and type of boat are not only safety tips, but also important environmental considerations. Regardless of your boat type, doing an initial assessment of water levels and current speed are essential.

Gardens Around the Community

Have you heard of the Million Pollinator Garden Challenge? It encourages the planting of native pollinator beds throughout the world. They have well surpassed their goal of a million beds.

Upon researching on Father's Day, the number of registered beds was 1,056,966. Visit the website (www.pollinator.org) to see a detailed map of all registered Pollinator Gardens throughout the world.

Be sure to check out the newly planted areas at the West Side automated entrance known to residents as 117th Avenue. The larger of the two beds contains a variety of Reblooming Daylilies, Allium, Sedum, Ornamental Grasses, Hibiscus, Hydrangeas, and two varieties of Spruce trees.

The smaller of the two beds has been registered on the National Pollinator Garden registry website thanks to the ever so wonderful Mrs. Kimberly White.

The following list of plants includes the common name of the plant followed by the Latin name. Cardinal Flower (*Lobelia Cardinalis*), Anise Hyssop (*Agastache*), Wild Tickseed (*Coreopsis Palmata*), Gray Headed Coneflower (*Ratibida Pinnata*), False Sunflower (*Heliopsis Helianthoides*), Calamint (*Calamintha Nepeta*), Golden Rod (*Solidago* five varieties), Butterfly Flower (*Asclepiis Tuberosa*), Carpenter Plant (*Silphium Perfoliatum*), Blue Vervain (*Verbena hastata*), Mountain Mint (*Pycnanthemum Muticum*), Iron Weed (*Vernonia leHermannii*), Rock Rose/Sun Rose (*Helianthemum*), Blazing Star (*Liatris Puntataa*), Liatris (*Liatris Microcephala*), Veronica, Swamp Milkweed (*Asclepias Incanata*) Black-Eyed Susan (*Rudebekia hirta*), Japanese Aster (*Kalimeris*), Autumn Sneezeweed (*Helenium autumnale*), Cup Plant (*Silphium perfoliatum*), Blue Vervain (*Verbena Hastata*), Tall Ironweed (*Veronia altissima*), Plains Coreopsis (*Coreopsis palmata*), Common Mountain Mint (*Pycnanthemum virginianum*), Cup Plant (*Silphium perfoliatum*), and Marsh Milkweed (*Asclepia incamata*).

Thinking about accepting the Million Pollinator Garden Challenge visit (www.extension.entm.purdue.edu) for a list of recommended Indiana-native Plants for Attracting Pollinators.

The native area will not be cut down in fall. This will allow the native plants time to reseed. We will clean this bed up in the Spring.

A Beneficial Bug house will also be placed within the bed. The house will serve as a home for Solitary Bees, Lacewings, Ladybugs, Butterflies, and Earwigs or any pollinator looking for a safe place to call home.

A big thank you to the Maintenance Department for loading the trailer up with mulch and for placing three large rocks in the larger flower bed.

All of this would not be possible without the support of POA Manager Rick Cleveland who was just as excited about being registered on the National Pollinator Garden website.

Thank you POA Members who are always so encouraging while Kim, Helen, Samantha, and me planted and mulched away. A special thanks of appreciation to the oh so amazing Mrs. Kimberly White whose vision of a native area turned into a beautiful reality for us all to enjoy for years to come.

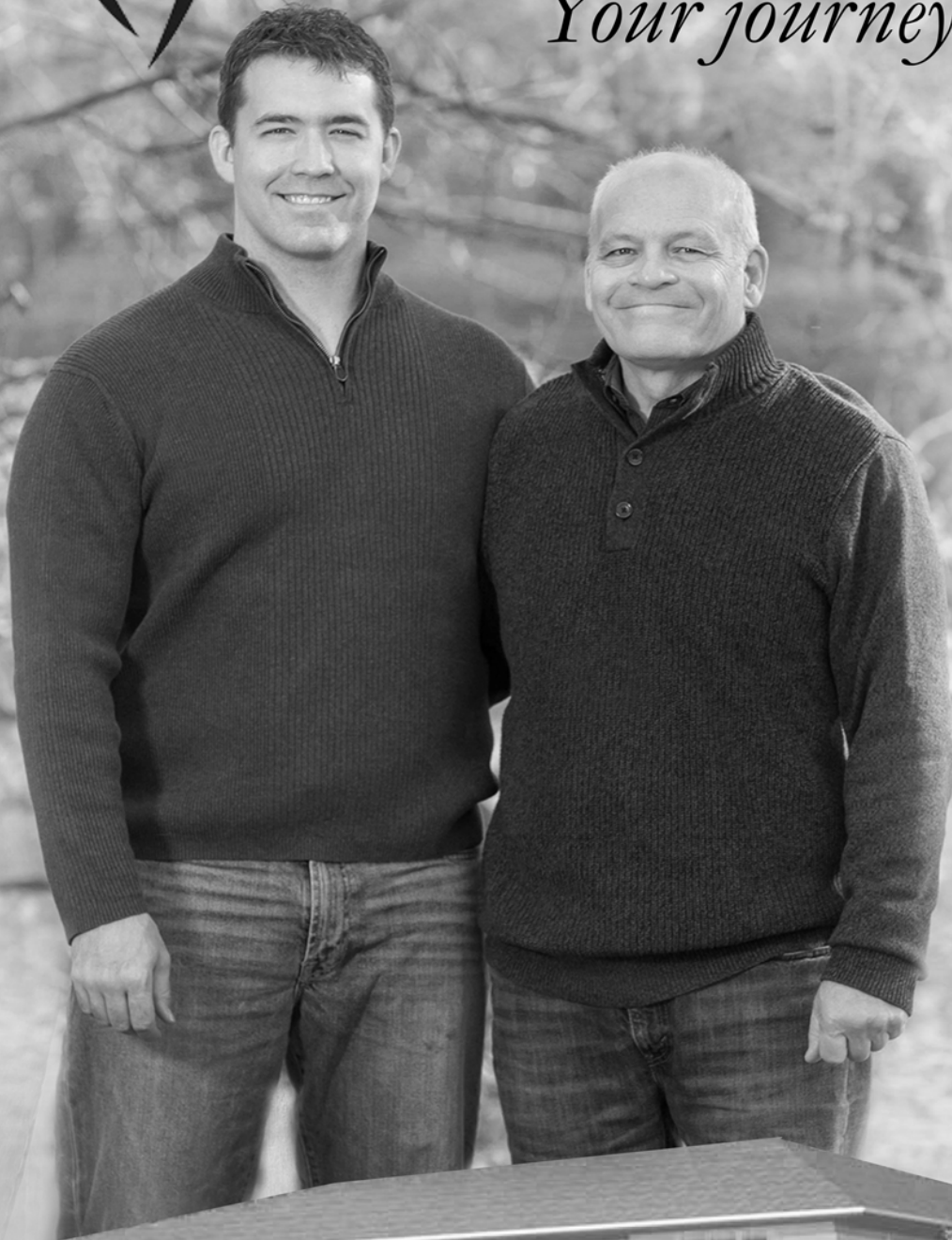

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Lakes Department

With 4th of July right around the corner and the Lakes being more crowded this year, I would like to review reoccurring issues Lake Patrol has seen this year and in previously years.

The use of fireworks on POA property is strictly prohibited. This includes the islands on Big Bass Lake, all the POA lake access areas, and the rental dock areas. A fine of \$250 may be assessed for discharge of fireworks on POA property.

While watching the fireworks on the 4th of July from a boat from Lake Holiday, all boats are required to be equipped with proper lighting. Required lighting is to be in good repair and operating condition and must be used at all times during nighttime watercraft operation. Also, Lake Patrol will have two boats with flashing lights on and will set up a "keep out zone" around the Seasons Lakehouse area from where the fireworks are set off. All boats must stay back 50 feet from the Lake Patrol boats.

To review a few rules Lake Patrol will be looking out for during the boating season:

- A person must be at least sixteen (16) years of age to operate any powered watercraft.
- The operator of any gasoline powered watercraft or a personal watercraft must possess and be able to produce a current, valid driver's license for age verification and identification purposes.
- The maximum speed limit for the operation of a watercraft during nighttime boating hours; no wake must be maintained.
- Big Bass Lake shall be idle speed and/or no wake at all times.
- The maximum speed limit during normal boating hours on Lake Holiday is thirty- five miles per hour (35 mph).
- All watercraft operated on the main body of Lake Holiday must travel in a counter clockwise direction at all times. NO FIGURE EIGHTS WHEN PULLING TUBES.
- All watercraft being oper-

ated on the main body of Lake Holiday must maintain a distance of not less than seventy-five feet (75 ft) from the shoreline when producing a wake.

- All watercraft being operated on the main body of Lake Holiday must maintain a distance of not less than one hundred-fifty feet (150 ft) from any other watercraft, skiers, swimmers and flotation devices when producing a wake.
- When approaching another boat, which is towing a skier, all watercraft must maintain a distance of not less than one hundred and fifty feet [150 ft] from the water skier.
- Water-skiing or towing any persons, objects or flotation devices without a spotter is strictly prohibited. The spotter must be at least thirteen (13) years of age, and the spotter's attention must at all times be focused on the persons or objects being pulled or towed.
- All watercraft must carry one (1) Coast Guard approved personal flotation device (PFD) of Type I, II, III or V per passenger if required. Any child or children under the age of 13 that are passengers on a watercraft must wear a personal flotation device at all times when a watercraft is being operated (in motion). All watercraft over sixteen feet (16 ft) must carry one (1) Coast Guard approved Type IV throwable device, such as a life ring or floating cushion.
- A spotter shall continuously observe the person or persons being towed and shall display a flag immediately after the towed person or persons fall into the water, and during the time preparatory to skiing while the person or persons are still in the water. Such flag shall be a bright red or brilliant orange color, measuring at least twelve inches square, mounted on a pole not less than twenty-four inches long and displayed as to be visible from every direction.
- Swimming beyond twenty- five feet (25 ft) from the shoreline on the main body of Lake Holiday is prohibited. (If you live on the lake

and have guests over please inform them of this rule, we see this all the time and it is very unsafe).

Boater Time Outs

Lake Holiday is 191 acres with an average depth of 8.8 feet. You can find a maximum depth of 20 feet in the southwest corner of the lake but the majority of our depth measurements were in the 10-15 foot range. We use the phrase 'Carrying Capacity' to indicate certain amounts of whatever it is we are researching to find out if we are damaging the lake long-term.

Boating is also measured in carrying capacity. Some of the weekend boaters on Lake Holiday may have noticed our lake patrollers turning on their lights and blocking traffic in the narrows off of Beachview Ct.

This area is the danger zone and when we see too many boats on the lake, we will close down high-speed traffic for up to 30 minutes. This is called a 'Boater Time Out'.

The reason for this is based on the number of boats and the types of recreation being supervised. Safety is our goal for the residents, but we also need to protect the shorelines, water quality, and docks.

The Indiana Clean Lakes Program mentioned in their 2006 summer newsletter that an optimum boating density is about 10 acres per boat. This means that Lake Holiday has an optimum boating density of 18 boats.

The area that is used for highspeed sports is only 95 acres bringing the optimum boating density in that area down to 9 or 10 boats.

When our patrol officers see too many boats surfing, skiing, fishing, or tubing in a concentrated area you may see us call for a 'Boater Time Out'. Please understand that we are doing this for many reasons but primarily for safety.

Once our patrol officer is in the middle of the lake anchored with their lights on you may still boat but at a reduced speed. This also means to stop any skiing, surfing, or tubing until the officer turns off their lights and begins patrolling again. Anyone refusing to yield to the officer will be ticketed and possibly lose lake rights for the rest of the year.

Please also understand that Lake Holiday is considered one of the smaller lakes in Indiana. We want to avoid shutting the lake completely down by giving everyone an option to take a short 'Time Out' during days of overcrowding. Any questions or comments please call the Lakes Department at 219-988-4722.

I ask all residents using the lakes to please review the LOFS Boating and Fishing Rules and Regulation book before going on the water. If you need a copy of the rule book, they can be acquired from a Lake Patrol officer on duty. Please have a safe and enjoyable 4th of July.

Golf Maintenance

The true heart of summer is here. July is the hottest month of the year. This will be the true test to see if the changes that were made to the fertilizer program have made a positive impact on the health of the turf. The slower growth created by the liquid fertilizer has helped with the cut of the fairways and tees, my only concern is that they are not getting the nutrition they need to continue to survive the long hot days.

This Spring we also sliced aerified the fairways and tees so the course would be as close to normal conditions as we could not knowing what was going to happen this season. So far, the fairways have been extremely firm. Golfers have been getting more roll from their tee shot, which most golfers have enjoyed. My concern is that the roots have not penetrated far enough in the soil to remain healthy the entire summer. We are going to have

to spike the fairways during the summer to get oxygen to the roots. Last year we went too deep and therefore it took too long to heal. This year we will only go just past the thatch layer which will greatly shorten the healing time.

Last year we started using humic acid on the greens to help the water penetrate the soil and not get caught up in the thatch layer. This has really helped with the firmness of the greens; they do not have the spongy feeling when you walk on them. They are playing better. There is still nothing that I can do about the humidity and dew point, the higher the dew point the slower the greens. The grass plant will hold more moisture causing the leaf blade to expand and therefore slow down the green speed.

The only projects planned for this month is to clean out a few ditches and cut down any dead trees on the course. I just want to concentrate on providing the best possible playing conditions.

Veterans Memorial Trail opens in neighboring Hebron

A ribbon-cutting celebrating the completion of the Veterans Memorial Trail in Hebron, one of the first Next Level Trails projects to open, was held recently in conjunction with National Trails Day. The 0.9-mile asphalt multi-use trail was constructed by the Town of Hebron with help from a \$302,956 Next Level Trails grant.

“Trails like this one are building a higher quality of place and space, connecting communities, and giving us another reason to get outside and enjoy the fresh air and get some exercise,” said Gov. Eric Holcomb, who recorded a special video message for the event. “We are proud to partner with you to complete this important trail project. And you should be proud, too, as one of the very first Next Level Trails projects to open.”

Hebron’s first trail is part of a regional effort to connect Hebron to Crown Point, following the U.S. 231 corridor. The route runs parallel to U.S. 231 from Tower Crossing on the west side of Hebron to the Lake-Porter county line, following an abandoned rail corridor. U.S. 231 is also called the Veterans Memorial Parkway, named for several war memorials built or planned along the route. The trail in Hebron will be the location for a planned Northwest Indiana Middle East Memorial dedicated to veterans of the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan.

In addition to the re-

gional Veterans Memorial Parkway effort, the new trail is also part of the route for two planned national trail systems, the American Discovery Trail and Great American Rail-Trail. The national trail systems routes are approximately 50% complete in Indiana and already attract regional and out-of-state trail users.

Veterans Memorial Trail is one of 17 Next Level Trail (NLT) grants awarded to communities and non-profit organizations through the NLT program in May 2019. The nearly \$25 million investment announced by Gov. Holcomb will develop a total of 42 miles of new trail across Indiana, the largest infusion of state trails funding in Indiana history. As part of Gov. Holcomb’s Next Level Connections initiative, the NLT program makes critical trail connections within and between communities. NLT is administered by the Department of Natural Resources.

The trail was developed by the Town of Hebron in cooperation with its Redevelopment Commission and Park Board. Key financial partners in the project include Greenline Landscaping-Excavating, Arcelor Mittal, and Harry Brown Trucking. The project also benefitted from the support of the Veterans Parkway Commission, the Friends of the Veterans Parkway, and the Northwestern Indiana Regional Planning Commission.

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Old church was a familiar sight on 109th Avenue

NOTE: This month's historical article is dedicated to the memory of Marilyn Kessler, a LOFS resident who recently passed away. Marilyn previously contributed to this publication in a column called "Along 109th", and this is her article from the March 1999 Seasonal.

"It almost seems that you can hear the choir singing in that old, old church along 109th. You know the one I mean. The one that stands next to the old farmhouse with the fancy gingerbread trim. The farm site is intriguing--especially that old church with its windows missing. A sign of days gone by. It seems that the church was built around 1852 and was known as the Deer Creek Church, advises Joe Vitucci. The church actually stood across Grand Boulevard and was moved many years ago to its present location.

"Mr. Vitucci moved from Merrillville out here about

five years ago because he wanted to enjoy country life. He used the old church for a barn and home for a number of felines. He has no definite plans for the old church at this time, but states he thought it might make a nice wedding chapel, but he would need lots of money and lots of help. What a neat idea!

"We believe that this was a Methodist Church, one of the first in the area. A Mister Vatic provided me with a copy of the list of the class at the Deer Creek Methodist

Church as of approximately 1870. Mr Orion Bacon was the leader, and the congregation included the Bacon family, Albert, Arunah, James, Maria, Melissa, and Milo. Names such as: Burge, Diddie, Fleming, Mikles, Patton, and Wyeth and many more are among the list. Near one hundred members! One cannot help but wonder how they came and what stories they could tell!

"Along 109th is part of the millennium project dedicated to appreciating our past as we look forward to the future."

torn down in about 2012, having been rather dilapidated and unsafe. One can still see the church founda-

tion in front of the farmhouse and barn on the north side of 109th Avenue, just west of Grand Boulevard.

Indiana State Fair canceled; Modified 4-H Livestock Show scheduled for August

that allows Indiana's youth to be recognized for their dedication and hard work.

The Indiana State Fair is an annual celebration of all things Indiana, showcasing youth and agriculture along with great food, animals, entertainment, and exhibits. It is a complex event that requires years of planning by the staff, partners and vendors. In 2019, nearly 879,000 people attended the Indiana State Fair.

Hoye said "We are grateful for the support of our State Fair Family; each one of you who makes the iconic event possible every summer. To our beloved fans, staff, sponsors, exhibitors, 4-H & FFA members, vendors, volunteers and entertainers -- we look forward to being back at full strength in

August 2021."

This is not the first time the Indiana State Fair was modified or did not take place. During the Civil War and WWII the Fairgrounds was needed to support the war effort.
