The Fourth of July is just days away and the sound of fireworks have already been heard all over our community. Just as we have over the past several years, we ask residents to please follow the state guidelines when it comes to the utilization of fireworks.

From June 29 and 30 to July 9, residents – per our state's guidelines - are allowed to use consumer style fireworks as long as they follow the strict guideline. A person cannot purchase these types of fireworks if they are under the age of eighteen (18), and minors cannot be in possession unless an adult is present at all times.

During these dates' fireworks may be utilized be-

tween 5 p.m. until two (2) hours after sunset. On the actual holiday of the 4th, they may be discharged between the hours of 10 a.m. and midnight.

The discharge of the fireworks is limited to your own property, or the property of someone who has authorized you to enter and display the fireworks. It is a violation to use any of the Lakes of the Four Seasons property for your display. This includes but is not limited to any one of the beaches, lakes, golf course, POA owned roadways, parks, islands, or parking lots.

Should you see any actions outside these set state rules we ask that you please contact 911 and provide them with as much detail as possible to the actions committed; as well as any descriptions of those subjects involved.

While we all know the day is meant to celebrate our country's independence, we still need to remember our veterans during this day of celebration.

We all want to celebrate the day with family, friends, and fireworks; however, some find those fireworks being enjoyed as an added stress - especially those who are suffering from PTSD. I am not trying to impede on anyone from having a good time, I'm just trying to raise your awareness on what some others may be dealing with.

I want everyone to think about the men and women who have served our country and how you could be unknowingly affecting them. The unexpected sounds of fireworks going off can leave some veterans in a state of panic that they often can't



So, what can you do to be more considerate to your neighbors who may be suffering from PTSD? For those dealing with PTSD, the unexpected sound of a firework going off may be the worst part and the main source of their anxiety. If we all follow the hours mandated by the state, these men and women would have a predicted timeline for when it would occur, and I am sure would be more

With the weather warming up and the July 4th Holiday right around the corner, I would like to review reoccurring issues Lake Patrol encounters every year around this time. The use of fireworks on POA property is strictly prohibited. This includes the islands on Big Bass Lake, all the POA public lake access areas, and the rental dock areas.

While watching fireworks on a boat from Lake Holiday, all boats are required to be equipped with proper lighting. Required lighting is to be in good repair and operating condition and must be used at all times during nighttime watercraft operation. Also, Lake Patrol will have two boats with flashing lights on and will set up a "keep out zone" around the Seasons

Public Notice for Hearing on:

Request of variance for installation of a Shed to exceed the rear setback community during the Fourth of July holiday. If you are going to do this you must purchase a temporary golf cart permit from the POA office. The fee for this permit is \$80. of these rental carts without a temporary permit you will be issued a citation with a fine that will cost more than the permit fee. system if it will be operated on the roads after dark. These carts can only be operated by Property Owners. Golf Cart Rules are available on the LOFS website.

Have a Happy & Safe **Independence Day!**



Right now, the cause of the swimming advisory is a minor blue/green algae bloom. It is only affecting Big Bass Lake at this current time and it is caused by the hot water temperatures. Avoid coming into direct contact with the algae or swallowing lake water. Keep a close eye on pets or small children, who may ingest water containing toxins produced by these algae.

My recommendation is to just keep small children and pets out of the water. Exposure to blue-green algae during swimming, wading, and water-skiing can lead to rashes, skin, eye irritation, and effects such as nausea, stomach aches, and tingling in fingers and toes.

After you swim, wade or ski, be sure to shower with warm soapy water. There is no timetable for the bloom to subside. We are checking the waters every day and as soon as we can green flag everything again, we will. Any further questions please contact the Lakes Department at 219-988-4722.


Teacher of the Year nominations are solicited from parents, teachers, and staff every February. Staff from each building then vote for a



Since 2004, Stagecoach



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You never know what's behind the origin of a surname

of residents

in the local LOFS phone book certainly verifies that our community is truly a melting pot, with people of diverse ethnic backgrounds.

Rather than delve into local or area history this time, let's take a look at the history of how some surnames were developed.

Each of us carries a distinct identity, an inheritance from centuries ago, that we'll pass onto subsequent generations. Of course, this is our family name. We take it for granted, but now and then we may pause and wonder how our surnames came to be.

Most surnames evolved during medieval times and are not simply words or sounds. Names originated mostly as descriptions of a person for selective identification and ultimately

names became hereditary. Briefly, most European surnames were derived from a man's place of residence, his occupation,

his father's name, or from a descriptive characteristic. The mass migration of Europeans also prompted the Americanization of many long-standing surnames.

A residence often determined a surname. Living near water were the Brooks and Rivers in England, the Strom in Sweden, Loch in Scotland, Jarvi in Finland, and Kuhl in Germany. Lesniak and Dolasinski were dwellers in Polish forests. A Stone lived near a prominent boulder, a boundary marker in England. A Gorski was a Polish mountaineer.

Occupations follow the same logic. A worker of iron in England was a Smith, a Schmidt in Germany, Kowalski in Poland, LeFevre in France, Smed in Denmark. and Kovach in Hungary. Consider the Weaver, Baker,

emerged into a system so that Potter, Wagner, Miller, Sawyer, and Carpenter.

Considering а father's name, let's not forget the Johnson (son of John), Robertson, Jackson, Thompson, Williamson, or Peterson. Other endings indicating "son" are "sen" (Norwegian), "ian" (Armenian), "nen"(Finnish), "poulos" (Greek), "wicz" (Polish), "vich" (Russian), and "ez" (Spanish). The Irish "Mac" and the Norman "Fitz" also denoted "son", while the Irish "O" is grandson.

Let's take a look at names that describe an appearance or characteristic. The redhead in medieval England became Reid, Reed, or Russell; in France, Rousseau; in Italy, Rossi; in Germany, Roth; and in Ireland, Flynn. Think about Young, Little, Fox, or Strong. A Nagy in Hungary was a large person. People with dark features may have been a Schwartz in Germany, a Karas in Greece, or Czarnecki in Poland.

On a personal note, this author's Slovak surname, with Polish similarities, has several meanings. One version means "one from Plucice (town of Plut's descendants), a village in Poland". Another is from the Polish word "pluc", (the verb "to spit"); literally a spitter. My moth-

er's Polish maiden name was Wojtowicz (a son of a mayor), and her mother was a Kobialka (a wicker basket), no doubt of occupational origins from centuries ago.

As a matter of information, the most common surnames in this country, in descending order, are Smith, Johnson, Williams, Jones, and Brown. Also, Miller, Davis, Wilson, Moore, and Taylor fall next in line.

Although this dissertation is certainly not all encompassing, perhaps this article may prompt an interest to determine the origin of your own surname. Good luck!





I want to remind all residents that using the golf course cart paths for anything, but a registered and paid-for round of golf is prohibited.

Specifically, the paved cart path at the front gate that passes around the back of Hole #17 Green is a public path. However, carts must exit onto the road once reaching the front gate; continuing travel onto the golf course's 18th Hole is not allowed and tickets will be issued for trespassing on the golf course property. Fishing on golf course property is prohibited!

These rules are in place for both safety to residents

and for preventing interruptions to golfers. Golf Course Rangers will be cracking down on those who choose to ignore signs and continue to use the cart paths for running, jogging, biking, dog walking, or non-golfing traffic with the issuance of citations at any time of the day. Thank you!

Golf Maintenance

Golf Course Superintendent The middle of summer has finally arrived.

July is the longest, hottest month of the year. The upgraded irrigation system will give us a fighting chance of getting through the rest of summer in good shape.

The irrigation system has been working fantastically! Now that we are not chasing bad decoders all summer, we can finally start raising some sprinkler heads to their proper height. This process takes about an hour per head so we will have to go on a priority basis.

There are a few other projects that need to be completed while I have staff. The ditch on the left side of hole ten needs cleaned up. The water is flowing properly through the drainage ditch, the debris

just needs cleaned up. Also, new ladies' tees need to be installed on holes 7 and 11.

I really do not like doing projects during the summer months, but my staff will be much smaller when the kids go back to school mid-August. If you know someone who wants a job when the kids go back to school, please send them my way. College kids who can on only work a day or two is okay with me. I will be flexible with the hours.

The heat of July can bring on several agronomic issues. Poa is a winter annual that dies when hot dry conditions arrive. The plant goes to seed in the early spring trying to populate itself in the fall. All the seeding that has been done over the years along with the divot parties has Junior Golf Academy started Tuesday, June 15. The duration of the program covers an 8-week period and we have well over 60 juniors.

Finally, I would like to wish Paul Boris success on his new endeavor and thank him for all he has done for the golf community. Secondly, I am excited to teach Joe Curtin and Finn Kiger as my new assistant interns; they will get into the PGA once they complete college. Lastly, I am personally excited to be back as your PGA Professional!

greatly reduced the Poa population.

Also, when the thatch layer breaks down in the heat it produces nitrogen. Too much nitrogen along with heat can cause several diseases like Pythium. Pythium can wipe out an entire golf course overnight. That is why soil test and aerification are so important. Slicing the greens and fairways help with the gas exchange which keeps the plant healthy during high stress times. The greens, tees, and fairways are monitored daily for any diseases.

The golf course is getting more play than ever before. With everyone using their own cart this is creating more stress on the turf. Please drive as much as possible in the rough. The taller grass can handle the stress from the extra carts better than the shorter fairway grass.
