Golf Maintenance

The 2021 golf season is about to get under way; we just need this late season snow to melt away.

Before the snow decided to fall seemingly every day, we did get a lot of projects completed. Several ditches were cleaned out to allow the water to flow properly. Also, several scrub trees were cut down and need to be removed first thing this Spring. All the 'no mow'

areas were cut down. This helps keep the areas from being overrun by trees.

These are just a few of the projects I was able to get completed. There are a few more that are going to have to wait until either fall or next winter.

Last season was a nightmare trying to get through the golf season while the decoders kept failing. The POA Board approved upgrading the electronics to the entire irrigation system. Each sprinkler head currently has a decoder; that decoder will be replaced with an IC unit.

There are 611 sprinkler heads and 96 surge protectors on the course. All the

ground rods will be tested to make sure they can handle a lightning strike without taking out the entire system. The entire project will be completed 'in-house'. My timeline is to have the project completed by the first week of May. I am excited to get started on this project and will give constant updates on Facebook and on the white board by the front entrance of the pro shop.

The start of a new season means that I will be looking for employees to help maintain the golf course, and Kim needs help with the flowerbeds. Just an early heads up that aerification is scheduled for Monday April 12 for the greens. We will be aerifying the fairways, tees, and several acres of rough. I am excited to get the season started.

Public Safety

This past month was something else; Mother Nature just remembered she forgot to give us snow the last couple of years, so she decided to drop early into the month all in one week. I want to thank all of the employees for all the hard work they put in to clearing our roads.

This year we noticed people placing their trash containers in the roadway instead of their drives as normal. While we are not really sure why this was done by quite a few residents, it happened. We ended up finding ourselves out there pushing cans back on to properties, so our plows didn't have to drive around them or chance hitting them while clearing the streets.

We also noticed some residents (less than normal) still thinking that it is okay to blow or push the snow from their driveways into the cleared-off roads and, when confronted, they complain

about the plows pushing the snow onto their drives in the first place. The plows, of course, only have one direction that the snow can go and that is to the side, which means it's ultimately going to end up at the bottom of your drive in some fashion or another. We just have to deal with that fact and push it to the side like we do with the rest of our drive.

If you're like me and some of my neighbors, you could shovel or snow blow the sides of the road in the direction the plows come through to mitigate the amount of snow that ends up on your driveway. This not only helps keep the snow mounds from piling up but also helps the guys in the plow find the edge of the road so they can be brought back to the width they should be.

Either way no one should be plowing, shoveling, or snow blowing any amount of snow back into the roadway with the thought that the plows will get it and it's not

a big deal. It is a violation of the community rules and subject to fines being issued, not to mention just inconsiderate to the guys who spent days clearing the roads in the first place. Also, frozen piles of snow on the street can make a plow truck veer into oncoming traffic when hit.

Now however, we need to be ready for all of this snow to melt and where it's going to go. As it begins to melt residents should be keeping an eye on their culverts to make sure they are free and clear from whatever the winter months may have blocked them with. Remember it is your responsibility to keep them clean and clear, so you and your neighbors won't chance being flooded out.

Home Safety

We have been getting numerous emergency calls for carbon monoxide detectors going off in homes. In most cases it's found that the battery was old and just needed to be changed out, or the detector itself was older than five to seven years and needed to be replaced. However, in some case CO was detected and residents were forced

Beginning Monday, March 1, the POA office will begin accepting and processing the 2021-22 annual assessments.

The POA Office will be closed to in person contact but staff will be available by phone and email. If you need to see us in person you will need to call to set up an appointment.

The following are a few key points for this year's assessments:

- Annual lot assessment is \$1,385.00
- Credit cards WILL be accepted for dues, fees, and memberships.
- Payments may be made between Monday, March 1 and Saturday, May 1. Payments received after May 1 will be considered delinquent and a \$50 late fee will be applied.
- All past due charges, assessments and fines must be paid prior to making the 2021-22 payments.
- The split payment plan may be made on or before May 1 when the application is properly submitted (processing

fee is \$50).

• The quarterly payment plan may be made on or before May 1 when the application is properly submitted (processing fee is \$75).

If you want to utilize one of these payment plans you MUST complete and submit one of the payment plan applications by 4 p.m. Thursday, March 25; Payment is not necessary on this date but the POA office needs to know ahead of time so the proper amount can be billed to your account. This will allow you to make these payments online through the LOFS website.

 3. Click on the Make A Payment tab.
 4. Click on Add Credit Card and then input the necessary information.

The entire Assessment Package is available on the LOFS website under the POA tab and then click on Applications & Documents.

- Reminder; DO NOT remove your existing vehicle bar codes. You will again receive a hologram decal that you will place along either side of your existing vehicle barcode. The first two hologram decals per lot are free; the third and subsequent decals will cost \$20 each. You must remove your old hologram.

April 1, 2021 will be the last day that 2020 amenities will be current. Any amenity fees pertaining to golf, boating, the dog park, and golf carts MUST be purchased before April 1, 2021 to be current.

to call for service to their homes.

Carbon monoxide detectors are just as important as fire detectors. CO detectors help provide early warnings of a potential leak. Carbon monoxide displaces the oxygen in your blood which is what your heart, brain, and vital organs need to survive

and since CO is colorless, odorless, and tasteless, you are potentially being exposed to poison and not even know it.

Take the time to inspect your home's detectors and make sure they are working. Just like a fire detector change the batteries every six months. If your CO detec-

tors are older than five years you should plan to replace it with something new. If your detector is hardwired, you should think about replacing it with one that has a battery backup so should the power go out, you and your family will still be protected.

LOFS water service provider CUII requests residents participate in fluoridation survey

As your community water service provider, we are looking for feedback directly from you! We are considering a change in our water treatment process and want your help. Community Utilities of Indiana, Inc. (CUII) has historically added fluoride into the drinking water supply during our water treatment process, but discontinued fluoride addition in May 2020.

We are seeking input from customers on whether to reinstate fluoride addition or not. Fluoride is a naturally occurring mineral and is naturally present in the water we pump from the ground in low concentrations (approximately 0.4 mg/L). Historically, we have increased the concentration to approximately 0.7 mg/L, which is the concentration recommended by the United States Department of Health and Human Services. We would like you to complete a very brief survey so we can consider your feedback prior to making a change to our treatment process.

It's that time of year again! Once the snow begins to melt away and the ground thaws out please be aware of the golf cart rules on the golf course. Golf carts must always remain on the asphalt path. This means no passing of a fellow golfer's cart while playing to prevent rutting to the grass surfaces surrounding the path during this period to reduce maintenance costs for repair allowing them to focus on course conditions. Once the weather breaks and course conditions dry out, golf shop hours will be extended on occasion based on those weather factors.

I would like to take this time to remind residents of the following rules and regulations to insure the safety of all residents as the golfing

seasons begins to become active again, they are in place to protect not only the course, but are more importantly in place to protect you and other golfers.

- There is no walking, biking, jogging, dog walking, or any other recreational activity allowed on the golf course cart paths or areas on the golf course, these are strictly for the use of registered paid golfers, they are not a means of transportation or recreation for anything besides golf. Every street crossing for the golf course has posted signs reading "Golfer's Only" to remind residents that the path at each street crossing is private POA property unlike the public parks and not a public path. Fines will be issued to residents for using the golf cart paths for any other means.
- Golfers please always be sure to register at the golf shop, it is a must that staff know who is out using the

facilities and at what time they began for any emergency situation that arises, whether it be severe weather or an emergency call from family or friends where you need to be reached, we will need to be able to relay that message to you or warn you of the approaching weather as fast as possible which we could not do if we have no record of you playing for the day.

LOFS, Winfield, Crown Point among the fittest places in Indiana, study reveals

With the pandemic restricting our usual exercise regimes due to social distancing regulations, many Americans have had to adapt their fitness goals and align them with at-home workouts. Combined with the fact that many of us are comfort eating while in the midst of a global health crisis, this may have led some to gain the so-called, 'Quarantine 15' without even realizing.

However, the good news about working or studying from home is not having to worry about your daily commute taking up too much time that could be used to achieve your at-home fitness goals for the day. But what happens if you don't have adequate space in your home and don't live near an open outdoor area in order to work out?

BarBend.com, a strength training resource and news outlet, compiled a comprehensive list of the top fittest cities across Indiana, using data backed by studies based on a variety of factors. These were combined to create an overall fitness score out of

100 for each city on the list. Fitness factors in this study include exercise opportunities, access to healthy food, air pollution, drinking water violations, physical inactivity, obesity and smoking, amongst others.

It was found that Winfield emerged in 5th position with an overall fitness score of 78.98, and LOFS 6th with a score of 78.75. Both have high rates of exercise opportunities at 930 (per 1,000 people) suggesting that the surrounding environment can play a key role in determining people's fitness level.

To see the full results visit www.barbend.com/fit-cities-indiana According to the CHR's county health ranking model, 'individuals who live closer to sidewalks, parks and gyms are more likely to exercise', therefore access to exercise opportunities is crucial in maintaining a healthy population. Additionally, residents who live in neighborhoods with access to grocery stores that allow them to obtain healthy foods, such as fresh

Early Winfield area settler was a brick maker; his product defined Crown Point buildings

As the Four Seasons was being developed in 1966, the first house under construction was at 1361 Brandywine Road, being

built for Tony and Betty Lazar. Tony, an avid golfer, certainly picked the right spot, which overlooks the golf course and is near the highest elevation in the Four Seasons, presenting an appealing view of the area. As a result, we know the first house built in our local community, but what about

the first house built in Porter or Winfield Townships? Unfortunately, this information is not known and is lost to history. Most likely, this first house was one made of logs in the early 1830's and is certainly no longer standing.

As more settlers came into the area and took up farming, there was a need for large houses, since most farm families had many children. As a result, the large Vernacular-style two-story type of house was built on local farms. Many of these houses can still be seen today, as one drives through our rural areas. As cities developed, there was a need for an alternate type of construction, the brick building, for fire prevention. It is in this setting that a Jacob Wise ap-

pears in our narrative. Several sources tell us that Jacob Wise, originally from Pennsylvania, moved west with his family to Ohio, then in 1849 purchased farmland in Winfield Township and moved here. While back east, one of Jacob's trades was brick making. The 1850 census shows Jacob, a farmer, his wife Maria, and five children living in Winfield Township. Similarly, the 1860 census reveals the same location for the Wise family, now with eight children, including son Henry, age 20, listed as a teacher. Jacob Wise apparently found the proper kind of clay on his farm and started making bricks. He soon had customers in Crown Point, furnishing bricks for houses and for buildings around the

square. He also built the first brick home in our area. The 1870 Winfield Township census shows two Wise households, the Jacob Wise family, with five children, and that of Henry Wise, a brick maker, and wife Eliza. Neighbors were the Dennis Sr. and Dennis Jr. Palmer families, founders of the town of Palmer. The Henry Wise family moved to Crown Point, where in 1872 he opened a brick yard, which was located in the 400 block of Walnut St., just west of the square. Clay was dug from nearby pits, and bricks were made and baked at this same location, now on a site near the present Colonel Wheeler Junior High School. The hole caused by clay removal was so large that in later years it

was used as the city dump. It was ultimately filled, and it is now the school's parking lot. The Wise brick yard made bricks for many Crown Point buildings. In 1878, the brick works provided over 500,000 bricks for the center section of the County Courthouse being built on the square. Henry Wise closed the brickyard in 1900 due to ill health. What about the brick works in Winfield Township? Most likely, it was in Palmer. We don't know where brick making took place, but a pond a bit south of town might be the pit where clay was dug. So, if you just happen to drive in Crown Point's square and appreciate the old ornate brick buildings, Henry Wise, an early Winfield Township resident, is the one to thank.

fruit and vegetables, are more likely to have healthier diets than those who do not have access to these kinds of supermarkets. The Hoosier State's array of outdoor recreations and natural wonders welcome year-round opportunity for all to build their fitness routines. Additionally, Winfield was found to have comparatively low levels of air pollution, low rates of physical inactivity, obesity, and smoking.

Indiana's full top ten, in order, are: Carmel, St. John,

Zionsville, Fishers, Winfield, LOFS, Westfield, Dyer, Munster, Noblesville, and Avon. Crown Point ranked 13th.

"There are a variety of external factors that can have an impact on a town's overall fitness, which can be detrimental to the population's health, especially where some don't have access to sufficient space for their at-home workouts," says Max Whiteside from BarBend.com. "If this is the case, you can still try and keep fit while going about your work for

the day by standing instead of sitting in front of your laptop, taking frequent breaks in which you can complete some lunges and squats,

making mobility work a part of your daily routine. Remember your own bodyweight can also be a useful workout tool!"

Operations and Building Maintenance

Leaf collection will begin starting April 5 and continue until the final date of April 19. No collections after April 19. All leaves must be at the road berm no later than April 18.

If they are put out later than that, there is no guarantee they will be collected. We will be keeping a record of when we have made our final collection for each street. If you want to know if your street has been completed call the Operations Department.

Please DO NOT place leaves on top of rocks or close to mailboxes. Leaves must be placed by the roadside and no deeper than 6 feet from the road. DO NOT mix branches or any other objects with the leaves. If you do the crew will leave your pile and go on to the next.

Branch Collection will begin on the Lake County portion of the community April 26 and will continue to the final date of May 3. Piles must be placed out on or before May 2, but no sooner than April 19. No branches will be collected in Lake County after May 3.

Porter County branch collection will begin on May 10 and will finish on May 17. Plies must be placed out on or before May 16 but no sooner than May 3. There

will be no collections after May 17.

Whitegoods & Electronics Dumpsters

These dumpsters are used for the recycling of all electronics, household appliances such as refrigerators and stoves. Tires may also be

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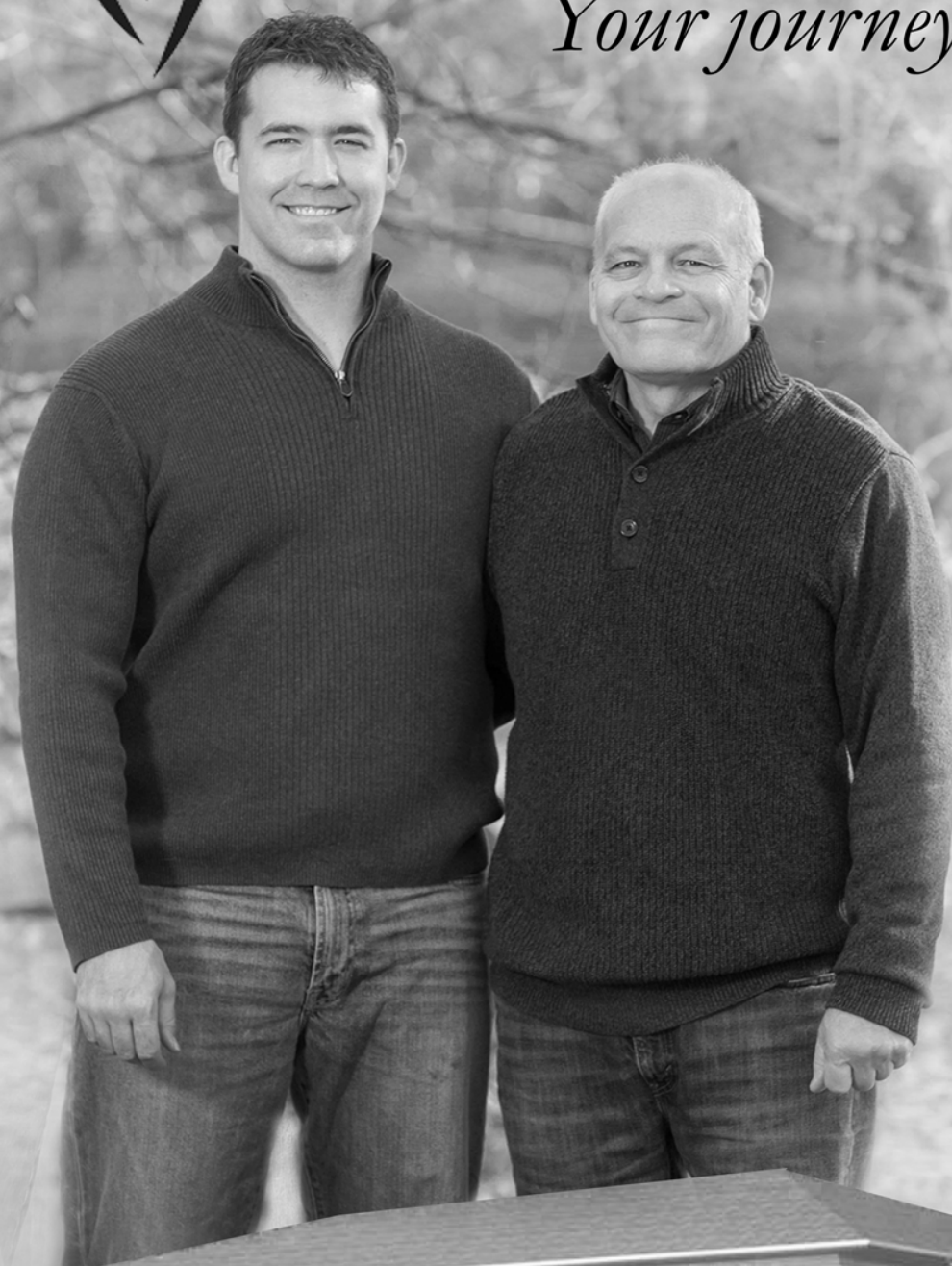
