#### POA Dues

Property Owners were able to begin paying POA dues for 2023 on Wednesday, March 1 with a due date of Monday, May 1. If you have not paid this year's dues, please make arrangements as soon as possible. Dues not paid by May 1 are considered delinquent and there will be a \$50 late fee charged. The Board of Directors approved a motion to deactivate Vehicle Barcodes if the annual assessment was not paid by the May 1 due date.

#### **Maintenance Crews**

It's that time of the year again for mowing, trimming, and other maintenance throughout the community for the Maintenance Departments. Please be careful and slow down when encountering the maintenance staff on a mower or work cart.

#### Leaf and Branch Collections

Spring leaf collections for the entire community have been completed for the season. Spring branch collections for the Lake County portion of the community began on April 24 and were completed on May 1. Spring branch collections will begin on May 8 and continue until the final date of May 15 for the Porter County portion of the community.

#### **Speed Bumps**

The POA has been installing the speed bumps throughout the community again. Please keep a lookout for the signs that say "SPEED BUMP AHEAD".

Please use caution when driving over them.

#### **Illegal Dumping**

I am requesting that all residents refrain from dumping leaves, branches, and grass clippings in the POA greenspace areas, on vacant lots or in any of the lakes or ponds. We provide branch and leaf collections in the Spring and Fall. You may also take your leaves or branches to the maintenance facility at 3861 Kingsway Drive.

#### **Property Surveys**

If you get your property surveyed to find out where your actual property boundaries are, the company performing the survey will install wooden stakes to mark the iron rods that were installed many years ago. Some of those iron rods have been buried or removed through the years and they will install new iron rods.

Once they have completed the survey and located or reinstalled the iron rods I request that you remove the wooden stakes in a timely fashion. Also, if they give you an updated plat of survey, I would appreciate it if you would bring it to the POA Office so we can make a copy and place it in your lot

#### **POA Board Member Election Process**

Voting electronically will be an option this year. The company, Survey and Ballot Systems, will be providing the service for this year's

Ballots will be mailed to all property owners of record with an explanation of how to vote electronically.

For those of you that are not able to vote electronically you will still be able to mail in your paper ballot to the company providing the service or you may drop your election ballot inside a locked ballot box that will be located inside the LOFS Seasons Lakehouse.

#### 2023 POA Board Election Schedule

Two of the five seats on the LOFS POA Board of Directors are up for election this year. Here are the key dates:

- Thursday, June 1 Friday, June 16 - Candidacy petitions will be available at the POA office for residents wishing to be listed on the ballot.
- Monday, June 19 Friday, July 7 by 4 p.m.
- Completed petitions to be turned in at the POA office. The order the ballots are printed, listing the candidates' names, will be determined by a blind draw only if there are more than one person turning in their peti-

tions on the same day to the POA office, and documentation verified as complete and valid.

- Monday, August 7 Candidates Night issues forum at 7:30 p.m. in the LOFS Seasons Lakehouse ballroom.
- Friday, August 11 Ballots will be mailed to all property owners of record and electronic voting site will open.
- Tuesday, September 5 Polls closed; paper and electronic ballots must be received by Survey and Ballot Systems by 5 p.m.. Survey and Ballot Systems will tabulate paper and web ballots and provide results to LOFS election chairperson
- Property Owners may also drop their election ballots inside a locked ballot box that will be located inside the LOFS Seasons Lakehouse. Ballots may be dropped inside the ballot box anytime the Seasons Lakehouse is open. The last day to drop them inside the box will be Wednesday, September 6th by noon. The election chairperson will be the only person that can unlock the box to retrieve ballots the day of verification and counting on September 6.
- Onsite ballots from the ballot box will be counted beginning at 7 p.m. in the LOFS West Lounge.
- Saturday, October 7 LOFS POA Annual Meeting at 10 a.m. in the Seasons Lakehouse Ballroom. Newly elected directors will be sworn in.



Although you may no longer see the grease, once it's disposed of down your drains it can remain stagnant in your community's sewer lines and will contribute to sewer backups and overflows.

The beginning of the golf season is finally here. I know there are a few days here and there where the weather is nice enough to play, but when May arrives even the cold days don't seem to be

The Leagues are getting started, the aerification is over for the season, all projects are wrapped up until Fall, and we get into a nice rhythm to the maintenance of the course. I really enjoy the routine of mowing greens

and raking bunkers, every day, cutting tees, approaches, and fairways Monday, Wednesday, and Friday. Mowing rough Monday through Friday.

Routine might seem boring to a lot of people but when everyone is trained and comfortable with their job the entire season goes smoothly.

As far as projects go, the bunker liners are finally installed, and the bunkers are

open for play. This is the first time we have tried to complete the bunker renovation in the winter and of course it was a warm one. We were counting on the ground to be frozen so the heavy equipment could drive on the turf without damaging it. Unfortunately, we had to wait until the ground was dry enough in the Spring to finish spraying the bunker liner.

Late Spring or early Summer, the plan is to widen the cart path on hole five from the road to the women's tee. The current cart path is six feet wide; I want to widen it to eight feet. This will allow our equipment to stay on the path while transporting and not tearing up the edges. Also, if an emergency vehicle needs to get to someone on holes five and six, this is the only entrance.

I am looking forward to another great golf season. I really am excited for the more consistent warm weather. Lately, it has been either shorts or Carhartts within the same week. There are a few new employees this season and they are going to make mistakes like anyone else starting something new, so please be understanding when you see a mistake, or they do not see you waiting to hit. ### Muskrats

I have received a few calls from residents on the lakes regarding muskrats. If you have a muskrat making holes on your shoreline, the first thing you need to do is make sure your shoreline is properly maintained and "hard armored". What I mean by "hard armored" is a seawall (that is in good shape) or some sort of rock (rip rap rock or good size cobble rock) to keep the muskrats from burrowing holes into your property.

If your shoreline isn't in disrepair and you do have an issue with a muskrat, I do have a live trap we can set up to try to remove the muskrat from your property. If that doesn't work the homeowner is responsible for hiring a professional trapper and making the proper repairs to their shoreline, if necessary. #### **Big Bass Lake Irrigation** Restriction

Last season the Lakes Department noticed an inva-

sive aquatic weed trying to take over Big Bass Lake. This spring, April 11, there was a whole lake treatment done that will eradicate the weed. Along with this treatment is a 45-day irrigation restriction FOR BIG BASS LAKE ONLY. The restriction will be lifted on Friday May 26.

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

### State Reps Olthoff, Slager: Local road projects receive state funding boost

Local communities are set to receive over \$7.9 million to complete much-needed road projects, according to State Reps. Julie Olthoff (R-Crown Point) and Hal Slager (R-Schererville).

**Funding** is available through the state's Crossings Community Matching Grant Program, which can be used for road and bridge preservation, road reconstruction, intersection improvements and other items. In total, 224 towns, cities and counties will receive over \$133.4 million in state matching grants.

cal infrastructure projects through preservation, road construction, intersection improvements, guardrail replacements and signage," Olthoff said. "Indiana is fortunate to be in a fiscal position to continue the Community Crossings Matching Grant Program."

Area grant recipients include:

- Cedar Lake, \$831,600;
- Dyer, \$136,831; • Gary, \$1 million;
- Highland, \$659,794;
- Hobart, \$1 million;
- Lake Station, \$391,738;
- Lowell, \$445,400; • Munster, \$597,125;
- Schererville, \$796,359;
- St. John, \$1 million;
- Whiting, \$375,000; and
- Winfield, \$680,917.

"Maintaining our transportation infrastructure is essential if we want our communities and the state to continue thriving," Slager said. "The Community Crossings Matching Grant Program has helped Indiana rank as one of the top states in the country for infrastructure."

To qualify for the competitive grant, smaller municipalities provide a 25% match in local funds, while large communities provide a 50% match. State law requires 50% of the available matching funds be awarded annually to communities within counties with a population of 50,000 or fewer. Since 2016, Community Crossings has awarded more than \$1.27 billion to improve local roads and bridges.







With the nice weather upon us and everything with our course starting up, like events and leagues, I want to remind the community about USE OF THE GOLF CART PATHS FOR NON-GOLFING PURPOSES.

I want to remind all res-

idents that using the golf course cart paths for anything, but a registered and paid for round of golf is prohibited. Specifically, the paved cart path at the front gate that passes around the back of hole #17 is a public path, however carts must exit onto the road once reaching the front gate; continuing travel onto the golf course's

18th hole is not allowed and tickets will be issued for trespassing on the golf course property. Fishing on golf course property is prohibited!

These rules are in place for both safety to residents and for preventing interruptions to golfers. Golf course Marshals and security will be cracking down on those that choose to ignore signs and continue to use the cart paths for running, jogging, biking, dog walking or non-golf traffic with the issuance of fines at any time of day. All in all, I want everyone to be safe.

vehicle and golf cart. If you are caught operating any golf cart or vehicle without one you will receive a citation.

Residents, you, and your guests need to obey the speed limit and stop signs. Every day we witness vehicles speeding through the gates and throughout the community. We get many calls and complaints from residents about other residents and their guests recklessly driving and speeding. The one thing we don't want is a fatal accident because some people can't follow the speed limit that's posted. We want everyone to get home the same way they left.

As you enter in any of the automated gates, you are supposed to stop and let the

car in front of you enter first, let the gate come down, then you proceed. We are witnessing some residents being impatient and speeding past the barcode reader, sometimes the reader will scan and other times it won't. Patience is a virtue. Also, you are not allowed to let non-stickered vehicles in the gate with your barcode. If you are caught letting someone in, you will receive a ticket in the mail.





### Some trivial items about local people and places are historic

Pluchinsky, LOFS Historical Society (*Part 1 of 2*)



If we use our imaginations, trivial items may be considered a part of history, so to speak. With that in mind, a review of the book The Indiana Book Of Trivia, by Fred Cavinder, published in 2007, might be of local interest. The book has about 1250 entries, and it has such categories as Agriculture, People, Education, Industry, Events, Government and Politics, Sports, Places, and Nature. Included in this article are some of the more unusual items of local interest and are mostly presented verbatim from the book.

Did you know that Solon

Robinson, whose support of settlers in Lake County led to the founding of Crown Point, became a nationally known speaker, promoting improved agricultural conditions? In 1853, he became agricultural editor of the New York Times. Also, early Lake County settlers, fearing they would lose their land when it was officially sold by the government, formed a squatter's union in 1836 and successfully intimidated bidders at a land auction by brandishing knives and rifles.

In the 1920s, when Cedar Lake was a resort area luring Chicago gangsters, tourists, and the socially prominent, it was fringed by 42 hotels. None of them survived into the Twenty First century. In

1920, when East Chicago and Indiana Harbor had a population of mostly single men or married men without their families, the area had 110 saloons. When the G. H. Hammond Company, a Hammond packinghouse, burned in October, 1901, covered in the \$500,000 in damages were 4,500 freshly slaughtered pigs. The business did not reopen.

In the mid-1940s, the Valparaiso University basketball squad was billed as the World's Tallest Team; several players were six feet, nine inches tall, a rarity in those days. One of the early members of the Harlem Globetrotters basketball team was Opal "Shag" Courtney, a graduate of Roosevelt High

School in East Chicago. Lowell High School in Lake County lost 62 basketball games in a row from 1951 to 1954. The first African American NFL player to start at quarterback was George Taliaferro of Roosevelt High school, East Chicago. He played six years as a profes-

Harriet Colfax, cousin of Vice President Schuyler Colfax, was the keeper of the lighthouse in Michigan City for 43 years, retiring in 1904 at the age of 80. Orville Redenbacher, the Indiana popcorn king, played sousaphone in the Purdue University marching band from 1924 to 1926. The Polish Cavalcade of Music on station WJOB-AM in

Hammond started in 1929, broadcasting on Sundays for 70 years. The show was started by Eddie Oskierko, who was joined in 1952 by Walter Skibinski (father of LOFS resident Darlene Marchina).

The Smith Brothers operated a cough drop company in Michigan City from 1919 to 1945, one of their sites in this country. By 1908, or 56 years after incorporation, the Haskell-Barker car company in Michigan City was building 15,000 railroad cars a year. It merged with the Pullman company in 1922. Kingsford Heights near LaPorte was created during World War II to house workers for the adjacent Kingsbury Ordnance Plant, which had 20,000 employees.

Alvah Roebuck answered a newspaper employment ad while working as a watchmaker in Hammond. The ad was placed by Richard Sears in Chicago, and a famous merchandising partnership was created when Roebuck got the job.

William Bercik, his wife Mary, and their son Robert all served as mayor of Whiting. Mary, elected in 1960, was the first female to be elected mayor in Indiana. In 1967, Richard Hatcher of Gary and Carl Stokes of Cleveland became the first African-American mayors of major northern cities.
