You don't want to miss this day – there will be so much to do and see. Aside from the tree lighting there will be food trucks, Santa, photos and so much more.



Fall has finally arrived. August and September have been two of the hottest and driest months of the golf season. The heat stress has really taken a toll on the areas that do not get watered by the irrigation system. Bluegrass

is a very hardy turf that can handle various weather conditions and can be cut at a variety of heights and survive.

Unfortunately, the excess cart traffic in a few areas around the greens has made the playing conditions too difficult to play the ball down. The cart signs are

Fall is a great time to control broadleaf weeds. After the first heavy frost I plan on spraying a broadleaf weed

Chip-ins- Phyllis Wayco killer combined with a crab-

grass control in the rough. The combination will help get control the crabgrass next season.

Crabgrass is an annual that dies after a heavy frost. When it dies it drops seeds for the next year. That is why they grow in the same spots year after year. Crabgrass control is designed to stop seed from germinating, that is why the area cannot be seeded until the residual from the chemical has been used up. Always read the label on any chemical vou use, the 'label is the law'.

This is also the time of the vear where the leaves on the trees start to change colors and fall. Our goal is to keep the in-play areas under control while maintaining the playing conditions. There will be times where we may struggle

to make sure they are not plugged with leaves and debris so the melting snow can drain properly.

Also, make sure the culvert under your driveway is free flowing so ice dams can't form. Winterize your vehicles too. Inspect your tires to make sure they have good tread on them so you can have better traction during those icy conditions. Make sure the fluids and filters are changed at the proper intervals and check the windshield wipers too.

Keeping an emergency kit in your vehicle will be handy in case you become stranded. This should contain a flashlight, blankets, windshield scraper, jumper cables, a shovel, bag of sand or salt, and a small first aid kit. Be prepared.

Leaf Collections for the **Entire Community**

Fall leaf collections will begin October 20 and continue until the final date of December 15, or the first major snowfall. The machines cannot suck up frozen piles of leaves.

No collections after December 15. All leaves must be on the road berm no later than December 14.

Do not mix branches, limbs and garbage with the leaves. DO NOT place leaves over landscape rocks or other objects that will get sucked into the leaf vac impeller.

Branch collections have been completed for the year. Trick or Treat hours are 4 to 7 p.m. on Sunday, October 31.

I want to remind all residents that using the golf course cart paths for anything, but a registered and paid-for round of golf is prohibited.

Specifically, the paved cart path at the front gate that passes around the back of Hole #17 Green is a public path; however, carts must exit onto the road once reaching the front gate; continuing travel onto the golf courses 18th Hole is not allowed and tickets will be issued for trespassing on the golf course property. Fishing on golf course property is prohibited!

These rules are in place for both safety to residents and for preventing interruptions to golfers. Golf Course Marshals and Security will be cracking down on those that choose to ignore signs and continue to use the carts paths for running, jogging, biking, dog walking, or non-golfing traffic with the issuance of fines at any time of the day.

In 1966 the Lakes of the Four Seasons opened and had the good sense to hire as its Attorney a 28-year-old kid who would singularly do great things for what would ultimately become a "Community".

He sat through hundreds if not thousands of board meetings, both public and private. He drafted countless documents, schedules, and letters. He settled hundreds of disputes, neighborly and not so neighborly. Some were

between Board members. Literally refereeing the occasional knock down drag out fist fights.

He fought Twin Lakes a dozen times and won and won and won again.

There were countless lawsuits, depositions, opinions, meetings, countless upon countless ways he continually, and dare I say, lovingly cared for this community. He also took a lot of crap.

On Sunday, August 22, 2021, Ted Fitzgerald passed away.

I will say this. The Wednesday prior to his passing I had a long visit with Ted. He admitted he had a great life and wasn't afraid. Like all good Irish-Catholics he died on a picture-perfect Sunday Morning - just so he could rub it in.

But along with that he said some things LOFS should be proud of. He said he loved this community. He said if he ever gets on his feet again he was going to help Four Seasons in any way he could and that he still wanted to

fight for you.

Ted and I were law partners for over 20 years. We had many clients. We had many long-term clients. He mentioned only one ... Lakes of the Four Seasons.

You may not know but for probably 50 years he held gate pass #1. Not because he was put on a pedestal by the Board, but at the time it was literally a Board argument, so he settled it. Give it to the attorney. He was able to golf for free. Since 1998 when I came on board Ted never

once, that I am aware of, took advantage of that. But he always said he could.

He was absolutely a Lakes of the Four Seasons original cast member.

I would like everyone to remember his civility, and more importantly his "undying" love and passion for this community.

HEBRON, IN - Attorney Theodore A. Fitzgerald of Hebron, 82, passed away on Sunday, August 22, 2021. He was a devoted and loving husband of survived wife Nadaline C. Fitzgerald for over 60 years. In addition, he was a beloved father of three survived children (Andrew, Kathleen and Thaddeus) and a grandfather of nine grandchildren. Theodore, "Ted", graduated from Valparaiso High School, the University of Notre Dame, and the University of Notre Dame Law School. While in law school, Ted served on the Notre Dame Law Review staff. Following a clerkship

with the Indiana Supreme Court, Ted served two years in the United States Army Military Police Corps. As a commissioned officer. Upon his release from active duty, he started practicing law in Hebron with Franklin Petry and maintained his practice there until 2017. He has represented the Town of Hebron, Lake of the Four Seasons Property Owners' Association, and Shorewood Forest Property Owners' Association for periods in excess of fifty years. He was the Porter County Child Protective Services Lawyer for 34 years and also served as a director of First

National Bank of Valparaiso for nearly 35 years. He is the recipient of numerous awards. He was honored as a distinguished Hoosier by Governor Daniels in March of 2009. He is also the recipient of the Friendly Sons of Erin Radigan Award and the Porter County Nequist Award. He has served on the character and Fitness Committee of the Supreme Court of Indiana since 1972. He was an Olympic torch bearer as a "local hero" for the town of Hebron in the 1996 Olympics. Ted was also an FRA Certified loco-


Covenant Enforcement



How did Randolph and other streets and avenues get their names?

the years,

names of some local roads have changed. County Line Road was once called Lake Eliza Road. Did you know that Randolph Street was once called Palmer Road, and that 109th Avenue was called Jenkins Road? Many rural roads were named after prominent local residents or farmers, and some still carry that identity.

Since our LOFS community traverses both Lake and Porter counties, it might be interesting to know how each county's road and street numbering system differs and how they were developed. Along the way, perhaps, we will try to find out how Randolph Street got its name.

Porter County, at some point in time, developed a grid system designed around two central main roads, Division Road, running east and west, and Meridian Road, running north and south. Each of these roads approximate the center of the county.

Subsequent rural roads were named and identified as to the distance from each of these two reference roads, usually in half-mile or onemile segments. Most existing roads or streets in established cities or towns such as Valparaiso and Chesterton, and in some in rural areas, were not changed to these revised designations. The 'meridian' road in Valparaiso remains as Campbell Road and as Smoke Road south of town.

Lake County, however, decided on a different rural road identification system, perhaps in the 1920s, as roads were improved and more cars became available. As the northern cities developed, each had their own street name and numbering system.

Gary, when being platted in 1906, developed a grid system, using the main north-south street (Broadway) as a reference. The first north-south streets east of Broadway were named for states in order of their entry into the union (Massachusetts, Connecticut, Delaware, Pennsylvania, etc), although there are some discrepancies. Similarly, those west of Broadway were named for presidents in order of their inauguration (Washington, Adams, Jefferson, Madison, etc).

Gary's east-west roads, called avenues, started from

Steel's main office, and proceeded south in numerical order. Lake County apparently used Gary's system for most of its east-west rural roads and certain names of streets in northern cities for its north-south road system.


What about Randolph Street and how did it get its name? A search at the county surveyor's office revealed it to be called County Road K on maps dated 1852 and 1902. Some older plat-maps did not designate road names, but a similar map dated 1972 for Winfield Township did show Randolph Street, with a portion called Palmer Road.

In our area, Randolph Street starts at 129th Avenue and proceeds north, going into Ross Township at 101st Avenue and dead ends at Ainsworth Road, north of U.S. Route 30. A search of county maps shows that Randolph Street again starts just north of a low, marshy area, continues into Hobart Township and is then called S. Hobart Road. Assuming the street was named after a prominent landowner, a vast search of census records for all three townships and of various plat-maps did not reveal any Randolph family.

However, if our local Randolph Street 'meridian'

In conclusion, we cannot determine who Randolph Street was named after, but we do know it was probably not from an early local resi-

dent. Most likely, Randolph Stret in our area was named from a street on the same meridian in one of the cities to our north.



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


