over 1,000 clubs over the past 29 years, and he has honed his comedy to a 'broken beer bottle's edge'. So, come hear his down-to-earth humor and



ATV's and UTV's not allowed on LOFS streets

In February of 2013 the POA Board of Directors approved a Resolution that states "All motorized vehicles operating on the streets and roadways of Lakes of the Four Seasons shall be 'Street Legal' in all respects. 'Street Legal' shall be defined as having all of the operational and safety equipment required by the State of Indiana for the operation of motor vehicles on highways in the State of

Indiana, including a current Indiana license plate. The only exception to this resolution shall be golf carts and mopeds and/or scooters having a motor of less than 50cc as permitted by Indiana statutes."

ATV's and UTV's are not allowed to be driven on any of the streets inside Lakes of the Four Seasons unless they are 'street legal' with a **current Indiana license plate.**

Fall branch collections for the Lake County portion of the community will begin on September 9 and continue until the final date of September 16. Piles must be placed out on or before September 15 but no sooner than seven (7) days prior to September 9. *No Collections After the September 16 Date.*

Fall branch collections for the Porter County portion of the community including Beachview Ct., Sandy Beach Dr., all of Brandywine Rd. & all of Forest Ln. will begin on September 23 and

continue until the final date of September 30. Piles must be placed out on or before September 29 but no sooner than seven (7) days prior to September 23. *No Collections After the September 30 Date.*

There will be no more collections once the crew has serviced your property.

Nothing larger than twelve (12) inches in diameter will be collected.

Do not mix rubbish, roots, dirt and yard waste with branches.

No drop offs will be allowed

We will collect branches

that have fallen due to storm damage. Please contact the Operations Department so they can schedule a collection.

During the branch collection period, we still have other duties that we must keep up with. That is why we are on a tight schedule and we must follow it. We look forward to your cooperation and if you have any questions please call Roy Green at 219-988-4461.

Once we have all the branches collected, we will begin leaf collection for the entire community on October 23 and continue until December 18. If we have a major snow fall, we will discontinue leaf collection until weather permits.

Preventing Home Pollution

At home water pollution is caused by many factors including, but not limited to: uncontrolled homeowner construction, yard excavation, leaking outdoor faucets, leaking sewer lines, improper discharge of wastewater, animal waste, and others.

Along with non-polluted air to breath, fresh water is one of the most vital resources for all life on Earth. Much of the water we consume and use in our day to day routine activities is supplied from rivers, lakes and other surface

water sources. These sources are becoming more and more polluted, causing a heavier demand on water treatment plants to meet our demands for clean water supplies.

While Governmental solutions to our water pollution problems are being force applied to our communities and industries. We as citizens also have a huge part to play in reducing pollution and cleaning our local waterways.

We can start by controlling what we allow to enter those waterways.

Home Yard Projects - Control

A simple home yard project may cause a great deal of water pollution. With a little prior planning most water pollution in the form of sediment runoff can be eliminated.

Any soil that's exposed without some sort of erosion control in place is subject to wind and water erosion. Even though sediment erosion is a natural form of water pollution, it has more of an impact than you realize. Sediment in an aquatic environment screens out sunlight, changes the water temperatures, inhibits photosynthesis (which leads to the decline of plant growth), disrupts the food chain, and ultimately leads to a decline of species in the water ecosystem.

Depending on the length of time the soil will be ex-

posed to the elements, there are several practical choices available for preventing sediment from ending up in our lakes and waterways.

- While working on a project surround the area with properly installed silt fence or sediment socks.
- Areas with exposed soils should have, sod put down or seed the area utilizing a product such as straw netting to limit erosion.
- It is best to use an underlayment of geotextile material in areas to be mulched or covered with gravel or riprap to limit both soil erosion and weed growth.

Home Chemical Use - Control

Runoff of fertilizers, herbicides & pesticides into our waterways and lakes cause drastic changes to the natural

ecosystem. These chemicals can kill plants, insects and animals in and around our lakes and waterways. Once the changes start, attempting to recover what we had will take a long time and a huge amount of money.

Also consider, the polluted water flows from one source to another, collecting more pollution at each location along its trip. Finally, this water makes its way to the oceans or into the water tables and public water system (your drinking water). We've all heard about polluted drinking water ending up in homes and in some cases causing health problems.

To apply pollution control over these and other chemicals like automobile fluids, paints, solvents soaps and detergents around the house

we must first start by:

- Reading and following the directions for mixing and use of all chemicals.
- Use organic options whenever possible.
- Prevent spills whenever possible. If a spill happens completely clean it up and properly dispose contaminated waste and clean up materials.
- Store and dispose of used chemical and their containers properly per the manufacturer's instructions.
- Do not mix or apply near wells, streams, lakes, curb or street side ditches.

Time for School

Time is just flying by, as it seems summer just started! With schools in session, Security wants to remind drivers to watch for our kids getting on and off the school buses.

Children sometimes don't look both ways, so it is imperative that drivers be ever watchful for the unexpected. It is the law for all drivers to STOP for any school bus that has its red lights flashing and the Stop Arm out. The law also allows a school bus driver to fill out a Stop Arm Violation Report and any officer can write a citation for the violation, even when not observed by the officer.

Whether the citation is written by the Public Safety Department or a police officer, it is similar to reckless driving, a blatant disregard for life or property. More important than paying a fine or points on a driver's license, is the pain of having it on your

conscious that you injured or killed a young student as you drove around a stopped school bus.

Parents, most of the violators in LOFS have been high school students driving to school. Please take the time to talk to them about this and other safety issues as they begin driving. This is important for them and others they share the road with.

Weapon Safety

Years ago, a previous director for this department took part in a program called 'Project Childsafe' and in doing so, was provided with a number of cable-style gunlocks.

We still have several gunlocks available.

All LOFS residents are eligible to request up to two of these gunlocks on a first-come, first-served basis, or until we run out. These locks come with an installation pamphlet, tips on handling firearms in a safe manner, and a message for your children.

These locks are FREE and can be obtained at the front gate. Let's do our part in promoting gun safety and start educating everyone in your family about firearms safety.

Practicing gun safety at home should be a no-brainer to everyone, but I'm going to give a few tips that may help avoid a dangerous and life-threatening mistake from happening.

We all know that there is never really a middle ground with gun safety; you're either safe or you're not. Leaving a weapon unattended after use is not safe, especially when children are present. The weapon should be secured out of sight and in an area that is inaccessible to prying eyes and inquisitive hands.

If you have no intentions on using a weapon and just have plans to store it away, leave it empty in your locked-

up area. You may even want to think about storing your ammunition in a separate locked up location from the weapon itself. You could even add a secondary locking device to your weapon that makes the firearm impossible to shoot.

Above all, *Pay Attention to What Your Children or Visiting Children Are Doing*, especially when you know there are weapons in your home. Make sure the kids in your home are aware and understand the safety guidelines concerning firearms. Remind them if they see a weapon that is unattended to not touch it, and immediately tell an adult so it can be safely removed.

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This Month in LOFS History

...and just like that, the 2019 LOFS Summer Concert Series comes to an end.

Do you recall when LOFS summer concerts as we know them today began? It's funny how we get used to 'things always being there'. As a long-time resident I can recall pop-up concerts performed by the Tommy Noonan Jazz band. Friends would call friends telling them Tom was playing near the pool and before you could say "Party!", there were around 30 golf carts and people dancing on the lawn.

Resident Bill Stack originally pitched the idea to the board of directors in 1999 to host official concerts in 2000 starting at 7 p.m. on

Thursday nights. 170 to 250 residents initially enjoyed those first few summer concerts, with each week featuring the likes of the Valparaiso Community Concert Band, Diamond Tone, and Big Ticket and the Hungry Brothers beginning late June through mid-August. Eight bands played the summer of 2001 beginning July 13 and wrapping up August 31.

As attendance grew and more and more non-residents began joining in on the fun, parking became an issue. In 2008 the board of directors enacted a parking fee to non-residents and requested various LOFS service groups to assist with parking along with keeping the monies for their group.

June 2, 2016 the first of 11 concerts kicked off the season featuring the Carolos Ramos Band. On June 30 2016 it was estimated over 1,500 people attended the 50th Anniversary pre-Fourth of July concert featuring the band Compass. By 2018 there were 13 concerts; 12 on Thursday nights and the final concert held Friday, August 31.

This summer we've been fortunate to have great weather for most of our concerts. The Unstoppables kicked off the fun on June 6 and Sticky Scissors closed Friday August 30.

As the years pass by and popularity of the concerts evolve, it's fun to see how groups will come early and pre-set up their chairs, blankets, and favorite spots to



Golf Maintenance

The ups-and-downs of the summer weather has come to an end. The extremely wet June to the crazy hot July and now dry August has kept us busy trying to keep up with the daily maintenance of the golf course.

The lack of adequate help has also created several challenges during the entire golf season. This has been a difficult summer, but I am proud

of the course conditions we have provided the golfers.

This spring it was decided that there would be no projects taking place on the golf course until after Labor Day, and I have kept my word. Now that fall is finally here, it is time to get going on some much-needed drainage work and tree removal.

The first project will be the area between the lady's tee and the fairway on hole #3. The area has become in-

creasingly wet over the years and cattails have taken over the area. A mowable swale will be dug between the homeowner's property and the drain by the cart path.

Next the drainage surrounding the 5th tee box will be addressed. A swale will be dug from the lowest spot in front of the tee to the ditch by the road. The ditch will also be cleaned out, this will allow the water to flow properly through the area. The homeowner side of the cart path will also be addressed. The project will be finished off with new landscaping.

There are many ditches that need to be cleaned out throughout the golf course. I

plan on getting to as many of them as possible this fall.

The last couple of years have been very hard on trees. There are several trees on the golf course that just could not handle the extremely cold winter followed by the hot summer. I try to give any tree as much time as possible to recover before it must be removed. Some trees have bounced back and survived like the three trees on the cor-

ner of #4 fairway. The trees on the left side of the 10th fairway look the same as the ones on #4 last year. I plan on giving them another year to see how they do.

Unfortunately, there are several trees that will be removed this fall. The stumps will have to be budgeted for next year to be ground out. The list of projects seems to be never-ending. I will only do one project at a time while

making sure the daily maintenance comes first.

The long summer has come to an end. The weather is cooling down which will help the turf recover from the summer stress. The kids are back to school and football season has arrived. This is my favorite time of year; I hope to get out and play some golf before winter arrives.

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

Who were the early inhabitants of our area? (Part 2)

A previous article on the subject described certain facts about the various Indian tribes in Indiana and where they went to. We now describe their activity in Porter County.

Numerous Native America mounds and burial grounds, trails, and former villages have been identified throughout Porter County. The first public document identifying such sights was made in 1834, two years before the county's formation. Over the years, farming, highway and road construction, and residential development have exposed certain sites and/or resulted in their destruction.

As a result, the Indiana Historical Bureau in 1931 commissioned a survey of Porter County archaeology. In 1932, the results were published by J. G. McAllister in a book titled The Archaeology of Porter County, including a map describing at least 36 locations of burial sites, mounds, camp sites, and villages within the county, including some locally. Excavations revealed numerous artifacts, skeletons, and arrowheads.

Among the principle

Native American villages in the county were two just east of Valparaiso, called Chiqua's town and Skeenwa's town. Also, an Indian village called Tassinong was located where a trading post and a town later developed north of Kouts, where present day Route 49 and Baum's Bridge Road meet. There also was the Huakiki village south of Hebron on present Route 231, as the attached photo reveals.

Many Indian trails traversed the county, some of which are now main highways. The most prominent, perhaps, was the Sauk Trail, from Rock Island, Illinois, to Detroit, which entered our area at Dyer Indiana, passing through Schererville, Merrillville, and Valparaiso, and then onto LaPorte and east. The Lake Shore Trail followed the Lake Michigan shoreline. Several other trails passed through Valparaiso. Others were near Hebron and the Kankakee River. Along these trails marched the Indian war parties, and those who went in the never-ending search for furs to trade for the white man's goods.

There are several Indian burial sites near Porter Indiana, and at least three near the Kankakee River south of Hebron. Most surprising is that there are 14


Indian mounds in the county, two near Chesterton, one near the Kankakee, and 11 near Boone Grove.

The Indian mounds near Boone Grove, most likely made by the Hopewell Culture in about 200 AD, are located east of town, in the general area of CR 550S and CR 250W. During the archaeological survey in 1931, these mounds were identified by the names of the farmers whose land they were on. It was found that most were flattened by farming over the years. The Wark Mound, the largest and best known, is about 10 ft. high and 300 ft. in circumference. A drive in the area and a search on a Google Earth satellite view aroused only the imagination; no mounds were apparent and some were imagined. Ironically, these mounds played a part in a controversial move by unidentified developers in 2005 who attempted to purchase land east of Boone Grove for a landfill. After numerous court battles, the local citizen's group, PROUD (Porter Residents Opposed to Unhealthy Dumps) stopped the endeavor on the basis that the land was on Indian burial grounds.

Over the years, many arrowheads were discovered by local residents and farmers,

and some are on display at the Stagecoach Inn Museum in Hebron. Many were found in the Lake Eliza area.

In future articles, we'll attempt to describe the Indian activities in Lake County, as well as early interfaces between Indians and the white man.
