### 2023 POA Board Election Schedule Update

Two of the five seats on the LOFS POA Board of Directors are up for election this year.

- Friday, August 11, 2023
- Ballots were mailed to all property owners of record and the electronic voting site opened.
- Tuesday, September 5, 2023 – Polls will close; paper and electronic ballots must be received by Survey and Ballot Systems by 5 p.m. Survey and Ballot Systems will tabulate paper and web ballots and provide results to LOFS election chairperson on Wednesday, September 6, 2023.

### ATV's, UTV's, Go Karts & Minibikes are Not Allowed on LOFS Roads, Parks and Accesses

All motorized vehicles operating on the streets and roadways of Lakes of the Four Seasons, shall be "street legal" in all respects.

"Street legal" shall be defined as having all of the operational and safety equipment required by the State of Indiana for the operation of motor vehicles on highways in the State of Indiana,

including a current Indiana license plate.

Golf carts are allowed to be operated on LOFS roads. Golf carts are herein defined as gas or electric powered four wheel vehicles designed and maintained primarily for use on golf courses and capable of transporting golfers and their equipment. Existing guidelines regarding golf carts remain in place.

# Be "Pet Smart" and considerate of our public spaces

Pet owners should be aware that their animals are not permitted to do their business, either #1 or #2, within any of the public spaces we share as a community. This includes the beaches, the grassy areas around the beaches, the sports fields, and parks. Please pick up after your pets when walking them along road berms as well. We have a Dog Park that all residents are welcome to join. Please be mindful of this as it is a nuisance and needs to be addressed.

Fall branch collections will begin on September 5 and continue until the final date of September 13 for the Lake County portion of the community. Piles must be placed out on or before September 12 but no sooner than 7 days prior to September 5.

Fall branch collections will begin on September 18

and continue until the final date of September 27 for the Porter County portion of the community including Beachview Ct., Sandy Beach Dr. & all of Forest Ln. Piles must be placed out on or before September 26 but no sooner than 7 days prior to September 18.

No collections after the September 27 date.

There will be no more col-

lections once the crew has serviced your property.

Nothing larger than twelve (12") inches in diameter will be collected. Do not mix rubbish, roots, dirt and yard waste with branches.

After the normal collections we will collect branches that have fallen due to storm damage only. Please contact the Operations Department so they can schedule a collection.





Fall has finally arrived! Most of the outings, leagues, and Club Championship are over for the 2023 golf season.

Before long the leaves will be changing color and

the temperatures will be much cooler, especially at night. The cool nights and warm days are a great time to get grass seed planted. We have already seeded the fairways to aid in the recovery in the areas of the

fairways that got damaged from the rain, heat, and cart traffic in early August. The tees and approaches will be seeded shortly after Labor Day. This will give the grass plant enough time to mature before winter. The process will only take a few days to complete.

The kids are back at school. The two college kids that worked this summer did a great job mowing, raking, and trimming the course. Now that they're gone those tasks still need to be completed, which gives us no time to do any projects. All our time will be spent maintaining the course. The only project planned is to continue the bunker renovation process late fall or early winter.

# Golf Services

As we are now in the heart of our season with events and leagues, I want to remind the community about the USE OF THE GOLF CART PATHS FOR NON-GOLFING PURPOSES.

Using the golf course path for anything, but a registered and paid for round of golf is prohibited. Specifically, the paved cart path at the front gate that passes around the back of hole #17 is a public path, however all carts must exit onto the road once reaching the front gate; continuing to travel onto the golf courses 18th hole is not allowed and tickets will be issued for trespassing on golf course property. Fishing on golf course property is also prohibited!

These rules are in place for both safety to residents and for preventing interruptions to golfers. Golf course Marshals and security will be cracking down on those that choose to ignore signs and continue to use the cart paths for running, jogging, biking, dog walking or non-golf traffic with the issuance of fines at any time of day. All in all, I want everyone to be safe.

> There are two technology labs with space for robotics, and the media center contains a space for student-produced news/media. Special education rooms have been purposefully designed with students' needs in mind, rather than retrofitting traditional classrooms.

> The roughly \$80 million of construction was funded through bonds and not a referendum, which means residents will not see an increase in the tax rate because of the project.

> "The planning and work that took place in order for us to be here today began years ago. In 2020, our school board put this project in motion so that we can


The beautiful home of Ben Lute and Christine Uskert at 2500 East Lake Shore Drive is a story of love of the house and the connection of two hearts.







# Some early Indiana colleges were started by religious institutions

Pluchinsky, LOFS Historical Society Arguably, the



best well-known colleges in Indiana are Purdue University, Indiana University, and Notre Dame University, be it in academics or in sports. However, there are smaller colleges in the state, some of which were formed by various religious affiliations in the 1800s. Let's take a look at the beginnings of some schools started

Locally, in 1859, the Valparaiso Male and Female College was founded under the sponsorship of the Northwest Indiana Conference of the Methodist Church. By 1860, it had

by religious organizations.

the Civil War brought a steep drop in enrollment. In 1871, the school was closed. but reopened in 1873 as a nonsectarian one called the Northern Indiana Normal School. In 1927. It then became associated with the Lutheran Church.

Notre Dame University represented the only significant effort of the Roman Catholics to establish an institution of higher learning in Indiana. Originally called Notre Dame du Lac, it was founded in 1842 by members of the Congregation of the Holy Cross. The first president, Father Edward Soren, was French, as were most early members of the faculty. In 1855, nearby St. Mary's

more that 300 students, but Academy for girls was chartered under the sisters of the Holy Cross.

> Surprisingly, Indiana University may have its beginnings tied to a religious affiliation. Under an act of the Indiana legislature, a county seminary located in Bloomington was chartered in 1820.

In 1827, the name of the seminary was changed to Indiana College; degrees were first conferred in 1831. The name was changed to Indiana University in 1838.

Several other smaller colleges in the state were also established by religious institutions. The oldest may be Hanover, a Presbyterian school located on the Ohio River, near Madison.

Academy in 1829, it became Hanover College in 1833, granting degrees in the liberal arts and sciences. Another group of Presbyterians founded Wabash College in Crawfordsville in 1833.

The Methodists founded several institutions of higher learning before 1880. The most enduring was Indiana Asbury University in Greencastle, chartered in 1837. Open to all young men, its first commencement was held in 1840. It was rescued from its financial difficulties through the generosity of Washington DePauw, a New Albany financial magnate. In 1884, the name of the school was changed to DePauw University in his honor.

Incorporated as Hanover The Moore's Hill College was established in 1854 in Dearborn County, also under the auspices of the Methodist Church. After closing, it was re-established as Evansville College in 1919.

> North Western Christian University in Indianapolis was founded by the Disciples of Christ. Among the church leaders was Ovid Butler, a prominent attorney and leader of the antislavery movement. In 1875, the school moved to a suburban section of the city, and in 1877 the name was changed to Butler University in honor of its chief benefactor.

The sole Baptist institution of collegiate rank was founded as a manual training institute but rechartered in 1845

as Franklin College, which was the first in the state to admit women. The Society of Friends (Quakers) established a number of academies (high schools), but the only one of their schools to become degree-granting was Earlham College in Richmond.

As a matter of interest, organized sports in the state began to develop after the Civil War. The first game in which there were intercollegiate contests was baseball. One of the earliest collegiate games was between Wabash and Asbury in 1867. By the 1870's, a variety of football had been introduced, but there were not yet any intercollegiate games.


